To: The Honorable Chair and Members of The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida

On behalf of the 21st Century Schools Bond Advisory Committee, it is my responsibility and privilege to present you with the Committee's Third Annual Report. As in past years, this Report provides an overview of the Committee's activities from April 1, 2015 through March 31, 2016. During this period of increasingly active implementation of the GO Bond Program, the Committee continued faithfully to discharge its duties and responsibilities to oversee the fidelity and alignment of the Program with its original goals and guiding principles.

The Committee's work is set forth in detail in the Report. It is worth highlighting the following:

During this third year, the project implementation pace increased noticeably, with over 220 projects completed and approximately 200 in construction, bidding, or design by the end of the reporting period. This rapid pace was reflected in the expenditure and contracted levels. As of March, 2016, approximately \$277 Million was expended for GO Bond projects, an increase of almost \$150 Million from the prior year, with another \$117 Million under contract. The Board also successfully sold \$200 Million in bonds, taking full advantage of favorable market rates, at an estimated cost savings to the taxpayers of over \$30 Million in interest, as compared to prior issues.

Just as notable was the progress made during this period in the area of small and micro business outreach and engagement. The Committee has closely followed the District's progress and has seen a marked increase in not only the number of Small/Micro Business Enterprise (S/MBE) firms participating overall in the GO Bond Program, but also in the individual levels of participation in the projects themselves. In addition, revisions to the selection of design professionals and contractors during this period further incentivized team diversity among participating sub-consultants and sub-contractors. The Committee anticipates these opportunities will be sustained throughout the remainder of the Bond Program.

We look forward to the year ahead and to our work together for the benefit of all the children.

Bond Advisory Committee – Duties and Responsibilities

On May 8, 2013, the School Board approved Board Policy 9145 on final reading constituting the 21st Century Schools Bond Advisory Committee. The Policy established the purpose of the Committee and membership requirements reflective of Miami-Dade's diverse make-up. Following are relevant excerpts of the Policy.

Purpose:

The purpose of the 21ST Century Bond Advisory Committee ("Committee") is to review, monitor, make recommendations to the School Board and Superintendent, and inform the public on the planning, progress, and implementation of the projects funded with proceeds from the 21st Century Schools Bond Program ("Bond Program") approved by voters on November 6, 2012. The Committee is formed to provide transparency and instill confidence in Miami-Dade County taxpayers that projects funded by the Bond Program are being delivered in a timely manner, are equitably distributed across the community and that the investments made are supporting the local economy.

Committee's Responsibilities:

- 1. Review and monitor the performance and program achievements of the Bond Program;
- 2. Advise the Superintendent and the Board of the progress of the Bond Program;
- 3. Assist in informing the community of the Bond Program progress and participate in District community outreach efforts;
- 4. Assist in the annual planning of activities related to Bond Program implementation; and
- 5. Make recommendations on the use of any surplus bond project funds or unspent project allocations.

The Committee's reviews and recommendations shall be reported on an annual basis to the Board, Superintendent and the community. The annual report shall assess the implementation of the Bond program to ensure that the Bond Program proceeds are being spent according to the published plan, that projects are being delivered in a timely manner and are equitably distributed, and that Bond Program proceeds are directed to the local economy.

Membership Qualifications:

- 1. Each voting member shall have an outstanding reputation for civic involvement, integrity, responsibility, and business or professional ability.
- Members shall have no direct or indirect conflict of interest in a contract with the Board or a financial interest in any projects that are funded by the Bond Program. Members are also subject to the residency and conflict of interest provisions of Policy 9140 - Citizen's Advisory Committees. In addition, Board member appointments are subject to the multiple appointment restriction in Policy 9140.
- 3. Members should generally reflect the geographic, ethnic, racial and gender diversity of Miami-Dade County.

Conflict of Interest and Code of Ethics:

- 1. Members shall not have any direct or indirect conflict of interest in a contract with the Board or a financial interest in any of the projects funded under the Bond Program.
- 2. Prior to serving, members are required to certify in writing that they do not have any direct or indirect conflict of interest in a contract with the Board or any financial interest in any of the projects funded under the Bond Program.
- 3. If a conflict or financial interest arises after appointment, the member shall disclose the conflict or financial interest and immediately resign or shall be removed from the Committee.

Executive Summary – The Year in Retrospect

March 31, 2016 marks the end of the third annual reporting period in the GO Bond program's implementation, following overwhelming approval by the voters of the Bond referendum in November of 2012. This third year has distinguished itself for its steady and fast paced project delivery, with many projects completed in the course of the year, as well as by the successful expansion of the Small and Micro Business Enterprise programs in all areas of project design and construction and the ever growing inclusiveness and diversity of project teams. Through the end of this reporting period, the District had almost 400 renovation or replacement projects on deck at different stages ranging from completed to planning.

Students throughout Miami-Dade County continue to be positively impacted by these efforts, the sole focus of which is to transform classrooms into learning-appropriate 21st Century instructional spaces. Likewise, exterior improvements, such as new playgrounds, parent drop-off areas and other site upgrades have added value to the overall school experience and are already in use at numerous schools throughout the District.

Year 1 Projects:

- ✓ Out of 68 projects:
 - ♣ 63 were substantially completed, including the new grade 6-12 addition @ M.A.S.T. on Virginia Key, which opened its doors in August of 2015; and
 - ♣ 5 were in construction, including the major replacement of Miami Norland Senior High on track to open in 2016.

Accelerated Projects (includes scope from projects in Year 1 through Year 5):

- ✓ Out of 197 projects district-wide:

 - 22 were in construction;
 - The balance was in design or bidding.

Year 2 Projects:

- ✓ Out of 54 projects with values under \$1M:
 - ◆ 15 were substantially completed;
 - **4** 36 were in construction;
 - 4 2 were in design; and
- ✓ Out of 9 projects with values between \$1M and \$2M:
 - ♣ 6 were substantially completed; and
 - 3 were in construction.
- ✓ Out of 16 project with values over \$2M:

 - ♣ 12 were in construction;
 - 4 1 was in bidding; and
 - 4 2 were in design.

Year 3 Projects:

- ✓ Out of 17 projects (11 with values between \$1M and \$2M, 3 with values between \$1M and \$200K and 3 with values under \$200K):
 - ♣ 4 were in construction; and
 - ♣ 13 were in bidding or design.
- ✓ Out of the remaining 37 projects, all with values over \$2M:
 - 4 28 were in design; and
 - The balance was in pre-design/planning.

Year 4 Projects:

✓ Out of 50 projects, 11 projects with values under \$2M were assigned to teams of architects and contractors. The remaining projects, all with values of over \$2M, were placed in groups for future bundled solicitations, and presented to the Committee at the September 2015 meeting, along with preliminary delivery method recommendations.

Small Business Participation:

Much progress continued to be made towards the overarching goal of helping SBE and MBE architectural and contracting firms 'graduate' to larger projects. Some of the key strategies instrumental in helping to accomplish this goal included:

- ♣ Issuing specific solicitations for sheltered markets, thereby assuring that the now more experienced SBE and MBE firms had an opportunity to compete for larger projects;
- ♣ Setting SBE/MBE goals for sub-consultants and sub-contractors on every large project to create opportunities for participation where none may have existed before;
- Restructuring the assignment of points related to the commissioning process both during the short-listing stage as well as during the interview stage to incentivize team diversity and collaboration. This was done under a Pilot Program endorsed by the Small Business Enterprise Advisory Committee and implemented starting with the solicitations issued in October of 2015. The results have been extremely positive as illustrated in the next two pages;
- ♣ Restructuring the assignment of points related to workload with the District based on an inverse scale, i.e. more points assigned to those firms with fewer commissioned projects and conversely, less points assigned to those firms with a higher number of commissioned projects.

The effectiveness of these efforts was further reflected in the number of different firms working on GO Bond projects. Through the end of the reporting period, 36 different architectural/engineering firms provided or were providing professional services in the capacity of prime on GO Bond projects, 22 of whom were District certified as either SBE or MBE; During that same period, 32 contractors provided or were actively providing construction services on a multitude of projects; 13 of those prime contractors were also District certified as either SBE or MBE.

Just as encouraging was the upward trend in the number of SBE/MBE and M/WBE sub-consultants and sub-contractors working with the prime firms. The tables in the next few pages show the significant level of diversity achieved for projects commissioned or bid in 2015-2106 and the level of participation by SMBE firms, as compared to the actual advertised required participation goals, and the voluntary inclusion of minority-owned firms.

These positive outcomes did not happen in a vacuum but rather were supported by continuous efforts by the OEO, the Office of School Facilities and the SBE Committee to 'grow' capacity in the pool of available firms qualified and eligible to do work on GO Bond projects. The additional following District accomplishments are noteworthy:

- ✓ Continued to actively certify small businesses, with over 770 entities certified as Small or Micro Business Enterprise (S/MBE) by the District as of the end of March;
- ✓ Continued to actively pre-qualify construction firms with over 150 contractors pre-qualified with the District by the end of the reporting period, 43 of whom were District certified as SBE, 39 as MBE and 85 also District certified as a Minority/Women Business Enterprise (M/WBE);
- ✓ Held 4 Quarterly Chat events with SBE and MBE firms to discuss emerging business opportunities, gain insight into their experiences as service providers to the District, provide training in areas of interest to them, and address questions and concerns with program delivery;

- ✓ Hosted 'All-In-One, All-Around Business Fair' at Miami Central Senior High School, for the purpose of presenting opportunities to potential job seekers, as well as information on technical training available to them, information on how to do business with the District, and how to achieve MBE or SBE certification. Over 25 local employers were on hand (prime contractors and sub-contractors) along with District departments, to interview and extend job offers to qualified applicants;
- ✓ Adopted Board Policy 6320.02 'Small/Micro and Minority/Women-Owned Business Enterprise Programs' which included among others, the following:
 - ♣ Accepted findings of disparity in the Board's utilization of African-American construction subcontractors and added this category to those for which the Board previously authorized narrowly tailored combination of race and gender-neutral and race and gender- conscious measures.
 - → Added to OEO's responsibilities implementation of measures under Policy 6320.06, 'Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in Business Operations and Practices', designed to increase diversity, equity and inclusion in business practices and operations, including compliance.
 - Authorized the Superintendent to develop affirmative initiatives and incentive programs to increase utilization of diverse SMBE and M/WBE subcontractors.
 - Revised upward the average gross threshold limits for graduation from the SBE program to enable greater participation.
 - ♣ Addressed the Service Disabled Veteran Enterprise Program as a distinct program and removed it from the M/WBE program since it is race and gender neutral.
 - ♣ Expanded the geographic area for certification eligibility from Miami-Dade County only to also include Broward and Palm Beach, thus expanding the pool of potential participants.
- ✓ Adopted Board Policy 6320.05 'Local Vendor Preference' which included among others, the following:
 - ♣ Broadened the policy to include state laws requiring vendor and employment preferences for Florida businesses and residents.

- → Aligned policy to reflect new statutory prohibitions on use of local preference requiring that for construction projects funded 50% or more through state appropriations, local preference cannot be awarded, and clarifying the provision does not apply to locally funded construction projects, such as the GO Bond program.
- ✓ Hosted workshop sessions for architects and contractors to roll out the details of the previously described pilot program to revise scoring for A/E and contractor solicitations aimed at incentivizing greater diversity in the make-up of subconsultants.

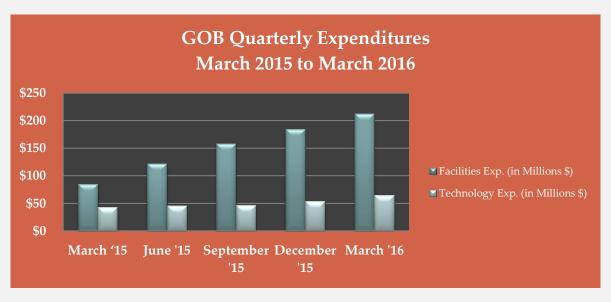
Community Outreach Efforts:

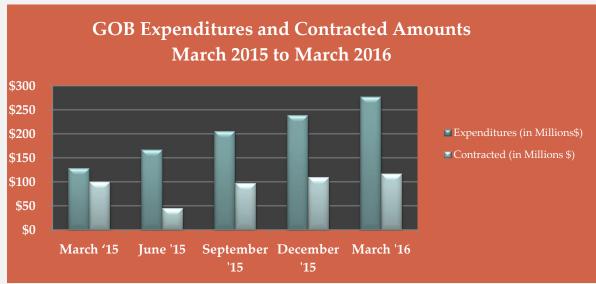
- ✓ Hosted ribbon-cutting events for completed projects at 7 schools, groundbreaking events at 2 schools and a topping out of the major addition at M.A.S.T. on Virginia Key;
- ✓ Continued to disseminate information to parents, students and the community on the progress of the GO Bond program's implementation through a number of media outlets and platforms;
- ✓ Continued to populate the GO Bond public Dashboard with project information, including budget and schedule.

In addition, under its 'Adopt a School' initiative, which affords Committee members the opportunity to select and visit one or more schools receiving GO Bond improvements to review on-going or completed work. Through the end of the reporting period, individual Committee members had visited approximately twenty schools. While overall the members had positive experiences with the work taking place, they also recognized the funding limitations of GO Bond program and encouraged the District to undertake additional improvements at the schools, as additional non-GOB funding becomes available.

Financial Activity:

- ✓ As of March of 2016 and over the life of the GO Bond:
 - ♣ Expended approximately \$277M combined for facilities and technology improvements, with another \$117M under contract, as compared to the \$128M of expenditures and \$100M contracted in March 2015. This sharp increase is reflective of the program's steep acceleration over the last year;
 - Secured Board authorization in May of 2015 to issue \$200M in GO Bonds.





GO Bond Program Update

Year three of the GO Bond program implementation was marked by quick ramping-up of project design and construction. With almost 400 projects at various stages of delivery, the District successfully transitioned from the planning and preparation that characterized Years one and two, to execution and project completion.

The growing pool of available qualified firms, coupled with strategic decisions to solicit large projects in groupings were instrumental in facilitating a much quicker project delivery without sacrificing quality and the overarching goal to engage as many new, qualified firms as possible in the process. The year was not without challenges, particularly as it related to project execution with fidelity to budget and original commitment. There were a number of projects completed below the allotted budget and steps were taken to reallocate available funds to other projects with unmet critical needs. This required development and implementation of a protocol, presented to and endorsed by the Committee, to assure fair and equitable distribution of those funds.

During the reporting period, program adjustments of the nature described above were discussed by the Committee on four separate occasions, as noted below:

The Committee was laser-focused on ensuring that fidelity to project delivery remained intact and to that end, allocated two entire meetings, one in February of 2016 and the other in March of 2016, to the topic of project scoping and development, funding allocation, and the potential need for program adjustments in the form of budget reallocations. The second of these meetings was held at a school site where Committee members were provided a presentation that detailed the evolution of a project from birth to completion, including details on development of a scope and attendant rationale for inclusion of specific items, design development and refinement processes based on available budget, and typical interaction among the parties, i.e. Owner, User, Designer and Builder to achieve a successful outcome. The discussion was

further informed by a tour of the host site where Committee members were able to connect the process to actual field conditions and the need to prioritize renovations based on level of criticality. Complete copies of the Committee presentations can be found in the Appendix section of this report.

Project Activity

As described throughout this report, Year 3 of the GO Bond program distinguished itself from prior years by the number of projects either completed or actively in construction, bidding or design. Among them:

completion of the 1,100 student station, grade 6 through 12 addition at M.A.S.T. on Virginia Key, which opened its doors to incoming students in August of 2015;



substantial progress on the Miami Norland Senior High School replacement project;



design completion and start of construction of the Frederick Douglass and Bunche Park Elementary replacement schools;





design completion and start of construction of a large project at West Homestead K-8 consisting of a partial building replacement, addition and renovations to the remaining buildings;



design of the expansion and renovation project at Madie Ives Elementary, which upon construction completion will provide for the reconfiguration of the school to a K-8 center;



completion of a number of renovation projects mostly encompassing exterior improvements such as window replacement and new air conditioning systems, and interior renovations generally consisting of









restroom renovations, flooring, ceiling and lighting improvements, and site improvements such as new playgrounds and portable removal;







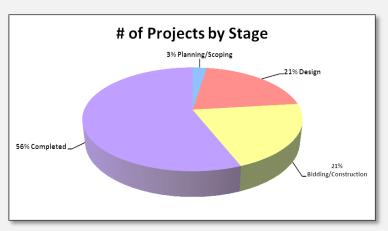




Lessons Learned

As of March 2016, the District was handling approximately 400 projects including advanced scope work, all at various stages of implementation as depicted below.

A program of this magnitude, with as many projects in play at any one given time as is the case under the GO Bond initiative, requires that adjustments be occasionally made to address and most importantly, manage expectations. The opportunity to hear reports detailing how project scopes are shaped, namely based on level of criticality, and how that in turn helps to inform design and construction of the improvements, was of great benefit to the Committee and the overarching goal of maintaining a transparent process. It is evident that while much progress is being made to upgrade school facilities through the GO Bond, some facility needs will remain until additional funding or funding sources are identified.

An additional factor requiring continued attention is the increasingly competitive nature of the construction market and the associated rise in labor and material costs that accompany it. This condition, which is expected to intensify, will continue to be closely watched by the District to avoid disruptions to project delivery. The tables that follow provide additional detail on level of effort and progress made through the end of the reporting period. It should be noted that these tables include GOB Year 4 projects, the vast majority of which have not started and are shown in planning. These projects are not reflected in the table and graph above.

Bond Financing Update

The District continues to exercise prudent and conservative strategies to finance the GO Bond program, without interruption but always bearing in mind potential impact on taxpayers. Expenditures and cash flow needs are carefully reviewed, and combined, they inform the schedule for future bond issuances. Based on that protocol, the Treasury Advisory Committee recommended and the Board approved, issuance of an additional \$200M in bonds for FY 15-16. The following schedule reflected the cash flow schedule and anticipated future bond issuances at the time of Board approval in May of 2015.

Following Board approval, the District was successful in competitively selling \$192,720,000 par amount of Series 2015 GOB on July 21, 2015. Including the bond premium, this provided approximately \$200M for project funding. Out of a total of six (6) bids received, Bank of America provided the lowest winning bid with a True Interest Cost of 3.897%. As a result of an aggressive schedule that allowed the District to take advantage of market conditions, the achieved True Interest Cost was actually lower than that obtained for the prior GOB issues, with an estimated cost savings to the taxpayers of over \$30M of total interest, as compared to those prior issues.

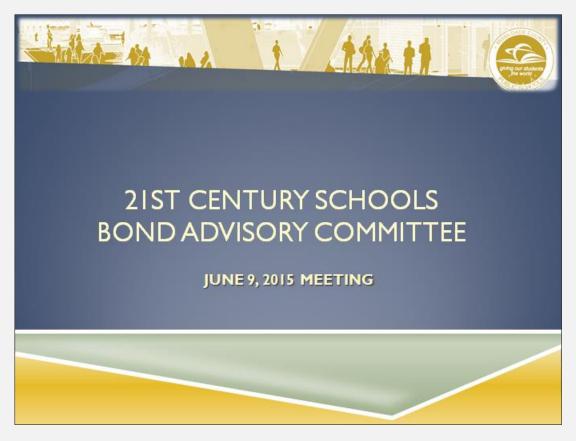
Careful and conservative financial planning in all areas of District operations, contributed to Moody's changing the rating for the District from negative to stable and affirming an A1 rating for outstanding Certificates of Participation (COP) and an Aa3 rating for GO Bonds. Moody's commended the District for the way in which its tenured and strong management team continues to implement financial best practices.

As of March 2016, GO Bond expenditures totaled approximately \$277M, which included approximately \$65M for technology related improvements across the District.

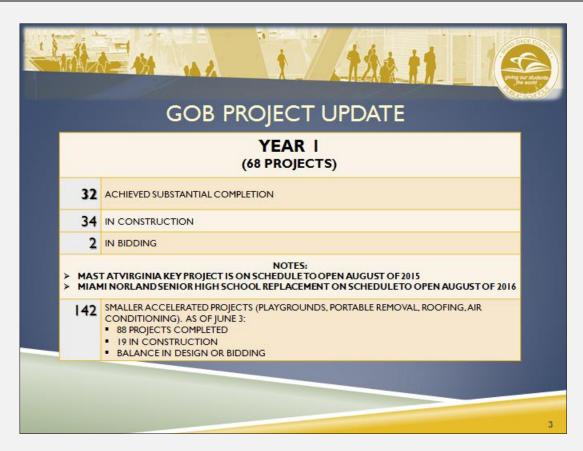

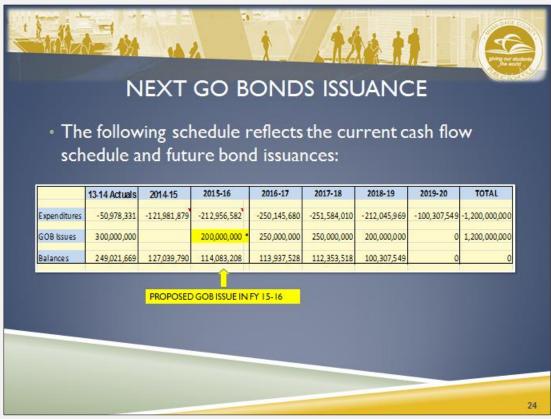


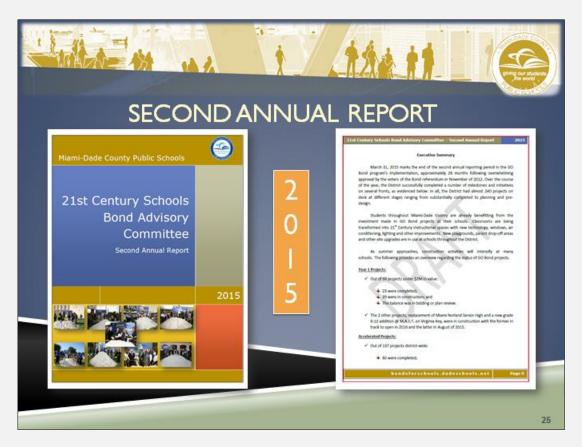




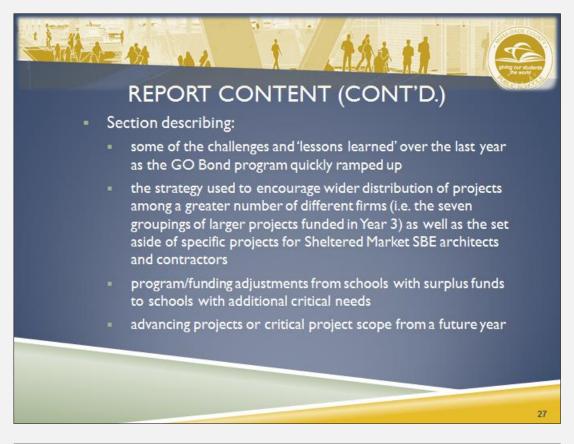




















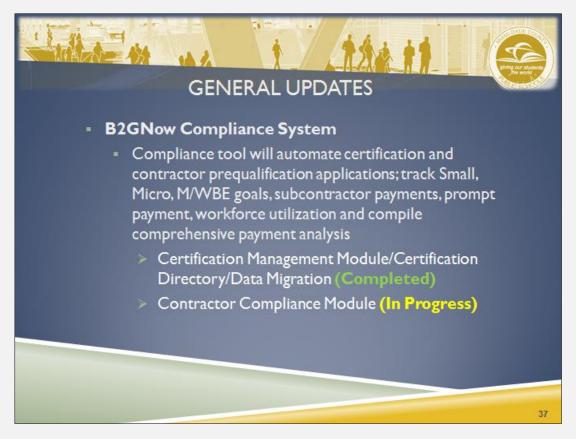




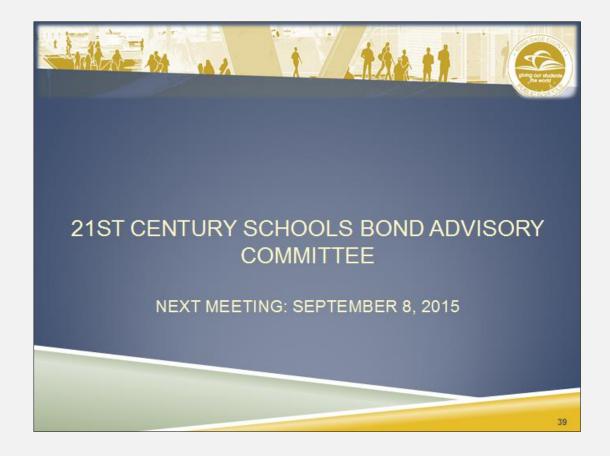












MEETING OF THE 21ST CENTURY SCHOOLS BOND ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES - March 3, 2015

The 21st Century Schools Bond Advisory Committee (Committee) met on March 3, 2015 in Conference Room 916 of the School Board Administration Building. Chairman Martinez called the meeting to order at 3:03 p.m.

Mr. Martinez called the meeting to order and acknowledged that due to the lack of a quorum voting on the previous meeting's minutes would be temporarily deferred. He then introduced Mr. Torrens, Chief Facilities Officer, and asked him to begin his presentation.

Mr. Torrens began his GOB update by asking the Committee to refer to page 3 of the presentation. Mr. Martinez encouraged the Committee to ask questions as the presentation went along.

Mr. Torrens provided an Update on the Year-1 Project Rollout as follows:

Of the 66 projects under \$2 million, 17 have been completed with the remainder in construction or bidding

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- The two larger projects, the addition to M.A.S.T Academy @ Virginia Key and the Miami Norland SHS replacement are in construction. The addition at M.A.S.T is slated to open for August of 2015 and the Norland replacement in August of 2016.
- Approximately 60% of the 119 smaller accelerated projects have been completed
 - 17 new playgrounds have been installed
 - 28 critical HVAC systems have been replaced
 - more than 100 portable classrooms have been demolished

Mr. Lowell asked how about expenditures v. the budget and whether projects were on schedule. Mr. Torrens advised Mr. Lowell that both topics would be discussed later in the presentation. Mr. Martinez also pointed out that there was a section in the presentation detailing budget adjustments.

Mr. Torrens next provided an Update on the Year-2 Project Rollout as follows:

- Initiatives such as expanding the pool of qualified firms to compete for projects, are being met through the SBE program:
 - There are 67 firms involved in the program as prime Contractors or Architects, with many are Small Micro-Businesses and MWBE firms;
 - A key factor in achieving a high level of distribution is the way projects are being grouped for solicitations;
 - advertising groups of projects together assures a certain degree of distribution of work while maintaining the participation of highly qualified firms for said work;
 - 54 of the 79 Year 2 projects (about two-thirds) are being done by Small or Micro-Business firms;
 - In addition to the on-going work, eleven (11) Groundbreaking events have taken place on projects over \$2 million. These events are important as ways of visually communicating progress to the community.

Mr. Torrens returned to the topic of the Small and Micro-Business participation, informing the Committee of the Quarterly Chats taking place with SMBE architects and contractors currently working on M-DCPS projects, as well as firms who may potentially participate. These sessions touch on topics such as competing for work with M-DCPS, billing and payment, including paying sub-contractors in a timely fashion. He noted as an example of the topics discussed at these meetings, a concern regarding the new requirement that Construction Management Firms carry Professional Liability Insurance from their first day of commissioning. This became a financial burden on the small contractors since billable work doesn't typically begin until about 3 months after a work assignment is made. As a result of input received from the Quarterly Chats, an agreement was made to require this mandatory coverage be obtained by the CM firms as of the date an actual Work Order is issued. As evidence of its commitment to the program the District refunded to Small and Micro business firms insurance payments

they had already made from the date of commissioning to the date of issuance of the first work order, subject to adequate proof of payment to the District. This resulted in approximately \$18,000 in refund disbursements. Mr. Torrens pointed out that this was seen as a correction the District needed to make in their procedures.

Mr. Torrens next provided an Update on the Year-3 Project Rollout as follows:

- 17 projects have assigned Architects and Contractors and are in the scoping phase;
- The 37 remaining projects are over \$2 million and require formal advertisements and commissioning by the Board.

Mr. Torrens next discussed the level of expenditures for Facilities and Technology since the initiation of the GOB. He noted that in the prior summer there was an intense surge in the installation of Promethean Boards and instructional technology in general within the schools, which was reflected in the expenditures breakdown. A year later, facilities related expenditures have significantly surpassed the technology expenditures. He noted that the District is starting to see the pace of work accelerate, an effort that will continue to pick up pace as new projects enter the design and construction phases. Mr. Torrens noted that the District will at some point in the near future need to consider issuing additional bonds.

Mr. Rubin pointed out that even though the Facilities expenditures have overtaken the Technology, the presentation shows that the Technology is still growing as well, and asked if this is inclusive of the laptops and the tablets being distributed to the students. Mr. Torrens clarified that the laptops and devices are not funded through the Bond, and explained that even though the bulk of the technology was completed in the summer expenditures will continue to grow, although at a slower pace, primarily in connection with new or replacement schools. Mr. Torrens then pointed out that expenditures totaled approximately \$118 million through the end of February, with another \$103 million of contracted work, which includes contracts awarded. Mr. Lowell asked if expenditures meant money spent in addition to the contracted amount. Mr. Torrens confirmed. Mr. Martinez inquired if there was a projection made for the end of Year 3. Mr. Torrens stated he believes figures will more than likely double.

Mr. Martinez welcomed the Superintendent to the meeting, and asked if he would like to address the Committee. Mr. Carvalho thanked the Committee for their continued volunteer work with the District. He then pointed out that in recent months and on average the Board has been commissioning between \$30-\$35 million worth of projects monthly. He reiterated his commitment to delivering high quality projects on time and in budget.

Mr. Carvalho continued by highlighting the advances made in terms of equity. He reminded the Committee about conversations between the District and many community organizers who wanted to ensure that promises made in 2012 would be realized in terms of fair opportunity, while still adhering to the sound principles of

competition in a market place like Miami-Dade. The School Board attorney has played a vital role in ensuring that policies are created in order to protect the overall process.

Mr. Carvalho concluded by addressing the Disparity Study and clarifying it is a draft (Phase I) and has not been finalized. An economist was commissioned not only to review the first draft of the study and address additional questions presented in order to accelerate the creation of Board policy specific to MWBE, but also to discuss aspirational goals for participation of minority groups in the porgram. Mr. Carvalho commended the Legal Department once again for their exceptional work in this area.

Lastly, Mr. Carvalho noted that even though it would be ideal to hasten the process, the financial aspect of the Bond program needs to be paced to protect taxpayers. One of the challenges facing the District is rising construction costs due to demand for similar services in the private sector. Mr. Lowell noted that in the private sector costs have risen, on average, 1.5% monthly. Mr. Carvalho then excused himself from the Committee to attend a different meeting.

Mr. Torrens next addresses local business participation. He pointed out that this initiative was a pillar of the GOB program and that to date, the District has been able to achieve over 60% participation by small and micro firms, at the prime contractor level. One of the goals was to enable small firms to graduate to larger projects, something the District is already witnessing. Mr. Torrens stated that verifications are a key aspect of this process to ensure there is compliance. Mr. Torrens then briefly discussed the summary charts displaying projects commissioned for design or construction and a synopsis of each project's participation goals.

Mr. Martinez inquired on the scope for D.A.S.H. Mr. Torrens explained that this is a hybrid project. The District leases gallery space at about half a million dollars a year for student work space. The Treasurer, with the Board's approval was able to secure a \$4.1 million loan, for 10 years, to build an addition above the school to take the place of the gallery space being leased. This work is in addition to the GOB project to renovate the existing building.

Mr. Rubin asked if the percentages on Minority Business participation vary by school. Mr. Torrens explained that when a project is advertised, the Goal Setting Committee;, comprised of multiple departments including Procurement and the Office of Facilities is convened by the Office of Economic Opportunity to review the scope and the availability of Small and Micro Business firms available to participate; this then results in goals being set. Goals may vary from approximately 10-30% depending on a number of factors including the size of the project and the nature of work being performed.

Mr. Martinez clarified that some firms although categorized as micro or small firms may also be considered minority or women-owned firms. Mr. Williams confirmed and went on to explain that the District's Race/Gender Neutral Program has a 90% participation rate for MWBE. Even though the District is using a race/gender neutral initiative, it is

maximizing participation on both the minority and the small business side, which is the purpose of the program. Mr. Harvey confirmed as well.

Mr. Torrens continued with the Year 3 update. He explained the difference between delivery methods, i.e. Hard Bid, a method typically reserved for a new building, versus CM @ Risk, which is the preferred method for renovations because it reduces the School Board's risk. In Year 3 there are 37 projects over \$2 million. Projects were grouped by project value to assure greater distribution of the work. He noted that a block of these projects is being reserved for Sheltered Markets, specifically for SBE Firms. Mr. Lowell inquired if we provide training to all these separate entities in order to assure they are following protocol. Mr. Torrens explicated that this is part of what is discussed in the Quarterly Chats.

Mr. McMurphy enquired as to the estimated value of the block of projects reserved for Sheltered Market. Mr. Torrens slides would be shown later in the presentation detailing this information in greater detail. He pointed out that market conditions are tight as Mr. Wallace had previously indicated, and added that this makes it more challenging for Contractors to find Sub-Contractors. One important consideration when looking at the size of projects is the pool of available contractors. Said contractors must be prequalified prior to submitting proposals on any project. The District would like to ensure that there are sufficient firms in all groups. He pointed out that as the projects increase in value, the number of pre-qualified firms tends to decrease.

In response to a question posed by the Chair, Mr. Torrens explained that the total project budget amounts were estimated when the Bond was first initiated, and were based on deficiencies found prior to 2012. These amounts were based on the most critical needs at that point in time. Dr. Foreman asked per the presentation at hand, why Miami Beach Senior high is getting a brand new building for \$3.3 million, but Coral Gables Senior High is only doing a renovation and was awarded \$10 million. Mr. Torrens responded by advising that Coral Gables Senior has a new building which is less than 10 years old. It is also located on a site where there wouldn't be any room to construct a new building while continuing everyday school operations. Also, the addition to Miami Beach Senior is small and will replace the only structure not previously touched by the main project. Ms. Metellus inquired about the difference in funding difference with respect to K-8 Centers, and Mr. Torrens stated that the size of the building being replaced is the main factor in determining how budgets are generated.

Mr. Torrens continued by discussing the idea of prototype schools, and explained how they create savings for the District by eliminating a portion of the design fees. These designs can be replicated requiring primarily site adaptation. Mr. Torrens feels that there is the capacity out there for Architects and Contractors to take on this work, which will help them to gradually transition to the next level. Mr. Williams elaborated by pointing out that in turn these firms will also continue to grow in their bonding capacity. As their Bonding capacity rises, so will their ability to compete aggressively for larger scale projects.

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Mr. McMurphy inquired if the bonding capacity is directly related to a firm's experience. Mr. Williams replied that the bonding capacity is typically related to a company's financial backing. In addition, the District evaluates a firm's performance over a five-year period to determine what the firm is capable of performing. Ms. Cagle questioned whether we are able to track individual firms' growth through the program in place. Mr. Williams stated that such is the goal of this initiative. He shared that two firms in particular had joined the program as Sheltered Market Micro Businesses, both being awarded \$200,000 Maintenance contracts and since then both had doubled their contract within the same year, and also increased their bonding capacity from \$200,000 to over \$700,000.

Ms. Cagle asked if Mr. Williams if he could project approximately how many Small or Minority firms will be able to confirm this when all is said and done. Mr. Williams advised that while it would be impossible to project an exact figure, he believes it will be more than ten firms. Mr. Lowell asked if these firms are able to compete for private sector work and Mr. Williams indicated they can.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to endorse the project delivery matrix and grouping strategy so that it may presented to the School Board. The motion was made by Mr. Jack Lowell, seconded by Ms. Gepsie Metellus, and passed unanimously.

Mr. Torrens pointed out that to date, 119 have been advanced with the Committee's endorsement. There are some additional projects in Year 4 and Year 5 which now need to be considered for acceleration. One school in particular is Sweetwater Elementary. There was a settlement with the Department of Transportation for \$1.2 million to do site work related to the widening of SW 107th Avenue. Advancing the proposed renovation project would make sense to avoid interrupting the daily functions of the school for consecutive years. By way of another example, Miami Edison Senior is being recommended to be advanced to Year 4 due to the need for critical HVAC work. Mr. Torrens continued pointing out multiple schools with smaller scopes which were recommended for acceleration. He noted that the advanced work was included in the deficiencies originally identified for each school in question. Dr. Foreman inquired about the source of the funds and Mr. Torrens responded that funding will be advanced from the Year in which the school was originally budgeted.

In terms of issues to date, Mr. Torrens pointed out that although the vast majority of firms have performed up to par and that the GOB rollout has been successful, there are still issues that arise. The protocol with respect to under-performing firms on projects under \$2 million is the cancelation of their Work Order and the reassignment of the project to a different firm. Other issues include finding a greater number of deficiencies than originally listed. Conversely, there are a few instances where the opposite has been found to be the case, resulting in a surplus. Mr. Torrens pointed out that one of the functions of this Committee is to authorize the reallocation of funding as and when necessary. Mr. MacMurphy asked if Contractors whose Work Orders have been terminated would be allowed to bid on future projects. Mr. Torrens stated that it would

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depend on how they were terminated. Work Orders do not require Board action in order to be revoked. However, if the District feels a Contractor has performed extremely subpar, the Board can vote to terminate the entity through formal action. In any case, additional work for projects under \$2 million would not be assigned to underperforming firms in the future. Mr. MacMurphy inquired as to the percentage of firms falling under this category. Mr. Torrens stated that to date seven schools have been affected; 1 Contractor and 2 Architects have had their Work Orders canceled.

Mr. Torrens continued the presentation with a description of a proposed funding reallocation from Parkway Adult Educational Center, formally Parkway Middle. Although the critical needs, such as air conditioning and life safety needs, will be addressed, the recommendation was that the remaining funds be reallocated to Myrtle Grove K-8 since middle schools formerly at the middle school are now housed at Myrtle Grove. Mr. Lowell asked about the impact of the K-8 conversion on student enrollment and Mr. Torrens stated that previously Parkway Middle was under enrolled. Myrtle Grove on the other hand, as it evolved into a K-8 center, has increased its enrollment and now requires additional capacity.

Mr. Torrens went on to explain the basis for recommending a deferral of the project at the English Center, a Year 1 project of approximately \$2 million, to a later year and at a higher level of funding. In the meantime, critical needs have been addressed. The recommendation was that the unused balance of approximately \$1.3 million be reallocated to other Year 1 schools which need additional funding. Mr. Torrens displayed slide # 32 in the presentation detailing the available surplus.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to endorse the proposed funding reallocations and the deferral of the English Center as noted. The motion was made by Mr. Jack Lowell, seconded by Mr. Cecil Daniels and passed unanimously.

Mr. Lowell asked how projects being bid at this time compare to the estimates at hand, and what kind of price increases are occurring. Mr. Raul Perez from the Office of Capital Improvement Projects stated that the District is experiencing a 3-8% increase in the cost of materials and a slight increase in labor costs. Mr. Torrens elaborated by providing some details to the Committee on the District's Direct Purchase Materials Program. This Program gives the District an advantage by savings sales tax on all materials purchased. While initially used only for major purchases the District currently uses it to purchase all materials (when possible).

Ms. Lerner inquired if there is any type of survey or evaluation completed once schools are finalized in an effort to better our services. Mr. Torrens stated that the Office of School Facilities has a liaison from Operations who visits each school upon completion and speaks to the principal to make sure that there are no loose ends from their perspective.

Mr. Williams began the Office of Economic Opportunity's update by highlighting that at presently there is in excess of 30% SBE participation for Year 1 projects. As of

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February 25, 2015 there were 622 certified SBE's, roughly 89.8% participation. Ms. Wyllie inquired what a 50/50 company signifies. Mr. Williams explained that it's a company owned by a man and a woman, or husband and wife, neither of whom has 51% or more ownership of said company. Mr. Metellus inquired if Mr. Williams is able to track Haitian participation. Mr. Williams stated it would be difficult, but it can be done. Ms. Metellus asked Mr. Williams to follow up regarding this issue.

Mr. Wallace noted to the Committee that in a previous meeting he had sensed dissatisfaction on the NAACP's behalf and asked for an update. Mr. Williams stated that he met with the President of the NAACP and is addressing the concerns brought forth to the District. He further indicated he believes the relationship is moving in a positive direction.

Mr. Williams continued his presentation by discussing a compliance software system purchased by the District titled B2GNow. This system has been successful with large entities nationwide and it tracks certifications, contractor pre-qualification applications, Small Business/ MWBE goals, sub-contractor payments and workforce utilization, as well as compiles comprehensive payment analysis. The initiative was kicked off in January 2015, and will be fully implemented in June 2015. Mr. Williams stressed that once the software is implemented, all applications will be automated. Contractors will be able to get certified online, as well as fill out their Contractor Pre-Qualification and renewal applications. The process of tracking utilization will also be automated. The sub-contractors will also be able to confirm whether or not they are being paid in a timely fashion. This process is necessary in order to be as transparent as possible in the District's practices. Mr. MacMurphy inquired if this will be able to track retroactively. Mr. Williams stated Year 1 will eventually be loaded even though this system is being implemented as of Years 2/3.

Mr. Brian Williams then provided an update on the Office of Economic Opportunity Outreach activities as follows:

Mr. Lowell inquired if the District had any comments on the documentation detailing the NAACP's concerns. Mr. Dotres stated that when the District met with the organization, every issue brought up was addressed. He pointed out that the implementation of B2GNow responded to 3 of the recommendations made. Mr. Dotres emphasized the importance of a strong monitoring component in order to be accurate and consistent. Other recommendations are still being worked on. Mr. Williams stated that an anti-discrimination policy has been created. He also advised that there is currently an RFP out for a diversity professional to train Senior Management in the procurement

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Department. An online training was also created for all staff. Mr. Wallace commented that he hopes the NAACP will once again be involved in this process in the future.

Mr. Harvey began by detailing some results of the draft disparity study. He pointed out that the Board has found that there is a compelling governmental interest to remedy the effects of discrimination with regard to the Small Micro-Business Enterprise and Minority Women Business Certification Program. Mr. Harvey then stated that there was a policy approved by the Board in January dealing with Commercial Anti-Discrimination, Diversity and Inclusion to ensure an equal opportunity for all businesses to participate in District contracts and receive District funds while ensuring that District funds aren't used to reinforce discriminatory practices. This policy applies to all contracts. All policies are detailed in the presentation handed out to the Committee. All these policies have been approved by the School Board.

Dr. Foreman inquired if these policies were created in response to the feedback received from the community, or were developed based on a specific issue. Mr. Harvey stated that back in 2011 the Board decided that a disparity study would be done in an order to obtain community feedback. This is part of the policy development process. Mr. Lowell asked if the comments made by the NAACP in previous months accelerated this process. Mr. Harvey stated that in a way they did, but that this had been in motion previous to the feedback provided by the NAACP. Mr. Williams pointed out that until now there haven't been any legal issues.

Mr. Martinez moved on and asked for a vote on the dates for the remaining 2015 upcoming meetings of the 21st Century GOB Bond Advisory Committee: June 9, September 8 and December 8.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to approve the schedule for the upcoming 21st Century Bond Advisory Committee meetings for the remainder of 2015. The motion was made by Mr. Jack Lowell, seconded by Rev. Guillermo Revuelta and passed unanimously.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to approve the Minutes of the August 25, 2014 meeting. The motion was made by Mr. Alan Rubin, seconded by Mr. Jack Lowell and passed unanimously.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to approve the Minutes of the September 9, 2014 meeting. The motion was made by Ms. Gepsie Metellus, seconded by Carol Wyllie and passed unanimously.

Mr. Martinez stated that it would be necessary to vote on the Committee's Chair and Vice Chair. He clarified that this is something that occurs every two years. Mr. Wallace stated he wished to vote for reelection of both the Chair and the Vice-Chair. Mr. Martinez asked that Mr. Harvey set the request the motion.

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Mr. Harvey requested a motion to re-elect Mr. Roberto Martinez as Chair of the 21st Century Bond Advisory Committee, and Ms. Cindy Lerner as Vice-Chair of the Committee. The motion was made by Ms. Gepsie Metellus, seconded by Mr. Paul Wallace and passed unanimously.

Mr. Torrens concluded by advising the Committee that if they would like to sign up to the Adopt a School Program he had the form available, and that Mr. Raul Perez from the Office of Capital Improvements would be contacting each Committee member to set up a walk through at their adopted school.

There being no further business to discuss, Mr. Martinez adjourned the meeting at 4:57 p.m.

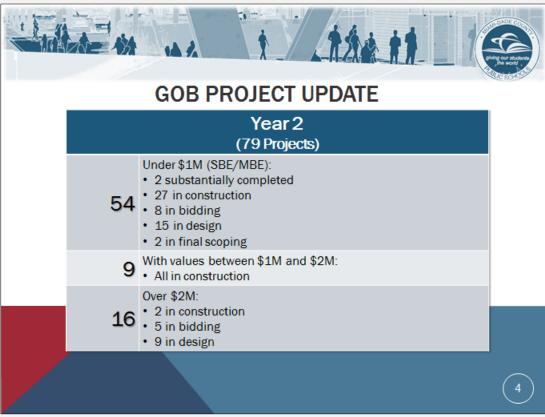
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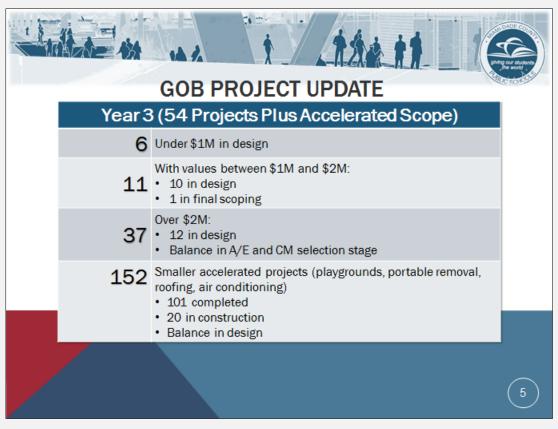
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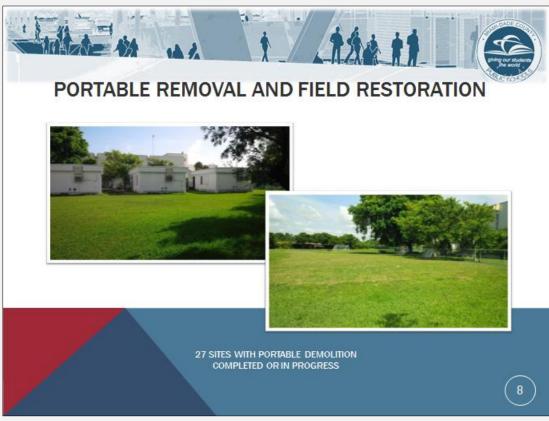
























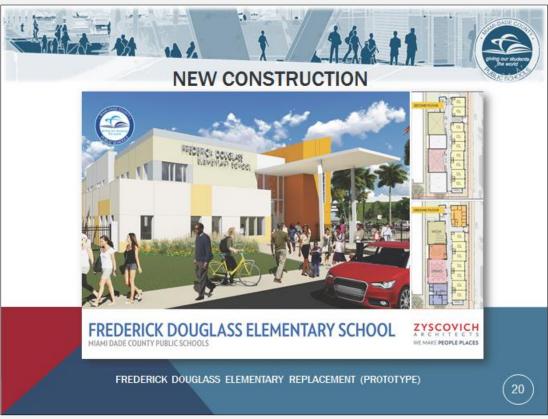








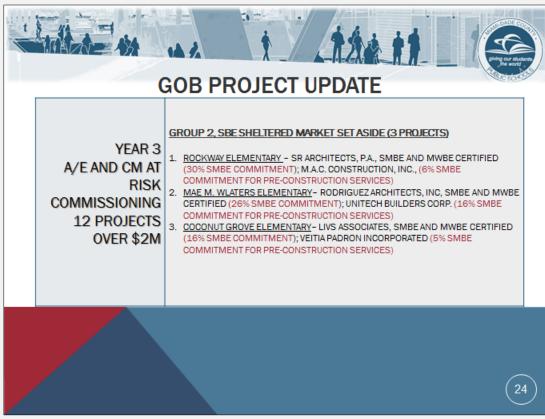


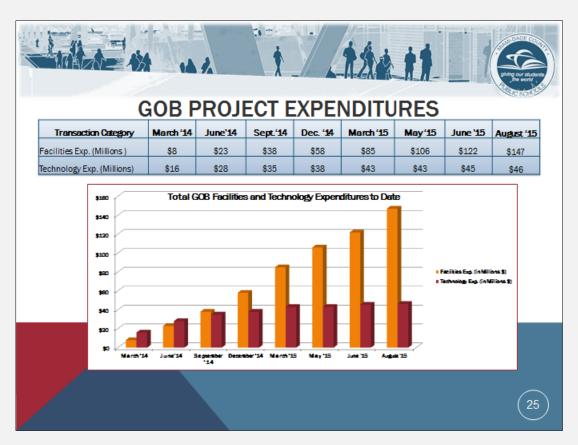


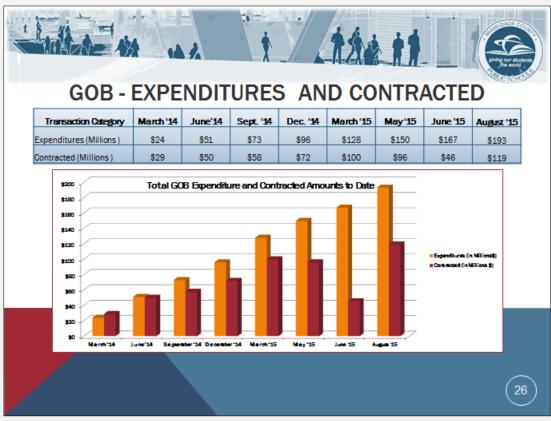


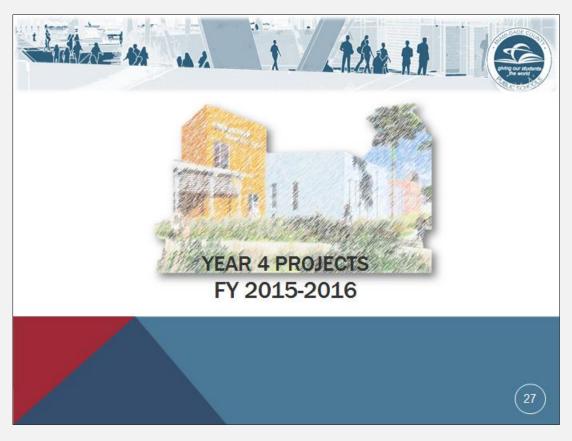








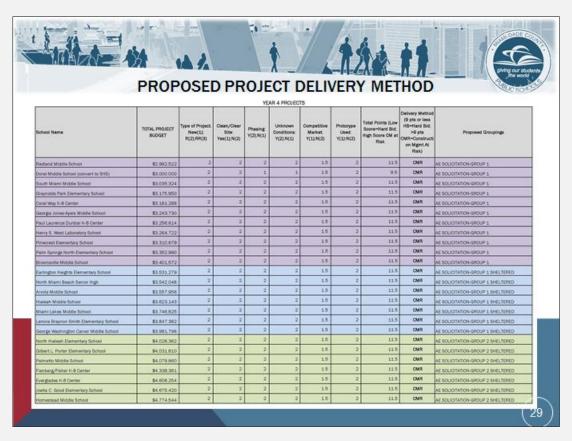


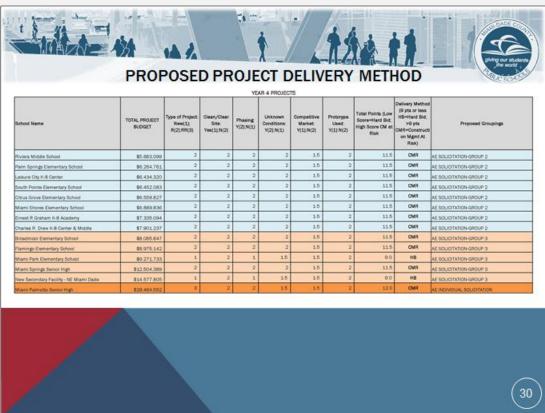




- 39 projects with construction values over \$2M will require separate solicitations
- A construction delivery method matrix has been completed for these projects (e.g. hard bid, CM at Risk) based on the protocol previously presented and endorsed by the Committee at the June 11, 2013 meeting









- With the objective of closely tying expenditures to projected cash flow needs, the District has been able to maintain the related tax burden reasonable as promised the Miami-Dade voters.
- Cash flow projections required issuance of approximately \$200 million in new bonds to meet the accelerated project schedule and related cash needs.
- The proposal to issue the next series of General Obligation Bonds was presented to the Treasury Advisory Committee, which recommended to the School Board the issuance of up to \$200 million at the beginning of the 2015-16 fiscal year.
- The School Board approved issuance of the 2015 GOB series on May 13, 2015.

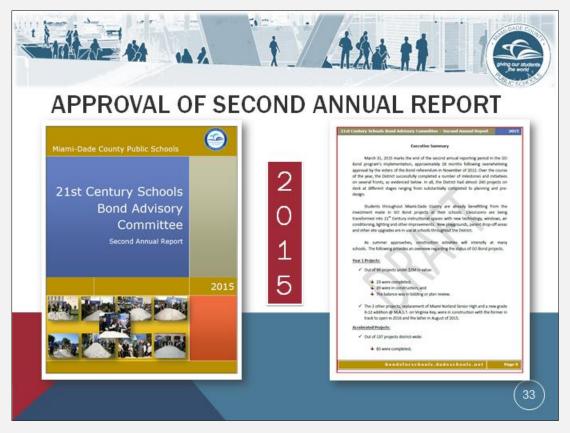


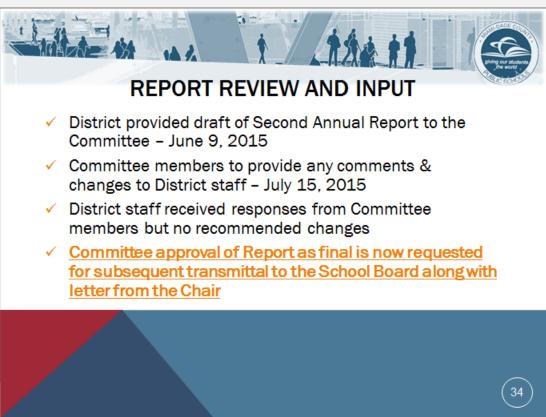


FINANCING UPDATE

- The District successfully competitively sold \$192,720,000 par amount of Series 2015 GOB on July 21, 2015, that including the bond premium will provide approximately \$200 million of project funding.
- Out of 6 bids received, Bank of America Merrill Lynch provided the lowest (winning) bid with a True Interest Cost of 3.897%.
- Due to an aggressive schedule to take advantage of favorable market conditions, the achieved True Interest Cost is lower than the interest rate obtained for the 2013-14 GOB issues, and will save the District and taxpayers over \$30 million of total interest cost in comparison to the prior issues.

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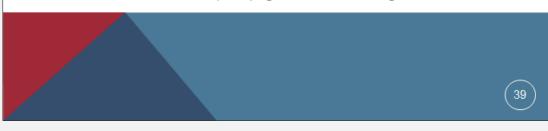

MEETING OF THE 21ST CENTURY SCHOOLS BOND ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES – June 9, 2015

The 21st Century Schools Bond Advisory Committee (Committee) met on June 9, 2015 in Conference Room 916 of the School Board Administration Building. Chairman Martinez called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

Mr. Martinez called the meeting to order and stated that voting would be delayed until later. He asked that Ms. Cindy Lerner, Vice Chair, begin her presentation since she would have to leave early.

Mr. Lerner spoke of her interest in sustainability and resiliency, adding that she is Chair of the National League of Cities Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee. This has afforded her the opportunity to remain abreast of efforts being implemented nation-wide, in turn allowing her to keep the South Florida community informed and involved when at all possible. Ms. Lerner noted her particular interest in addressing challenges associated with climate change and sea level rise. Ms. Lerner also noted her office's work with schools within the Village of Pinecrest for the past six years in an effort to advance sensitivity and understanding of what the aforementioned

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principles mean and incorporating them into learning objectives through the teachers, the PTA and through School Operations.

Shortly after the creation of this Advisory Board, it became clear that it was important for M-DCPS to address long-term future needs in the areas of sustainability and resiliency. Ms. Lerner expressed her hope that the District would explore energy efficiency and renewable energy. This will likely prove challenging given the lack of legislative support at the state level. In comparison to the rest of the nation, Florida is not on par in terms of energy efficiency and renewable energy initiatives. Ms. Lerner noted that in the Village of Pinecrest, codes and regulations were adjusted so that new homes and commercial buildings take renewable energy into consideration, making it easier for future installations should the owner elect to install energy efficient products.

Ms. Lerner stated that in her opinion, every school once completed should be as efficient as possible, including solar energy. To that end, the US Department of Energy's website provides information on initiatives being implemented in various communities. Ms. Lerner noted the efforts of Broward County and Palm Beach County.

Mr. Martinez then recognized Mr. Alberto Carvalho, Superintendent of Schools, who had joined the Committee.

Mr. Torrens expressed the District is extremely serious in its consideration of energy and utility conservation and shared how even in the first Bond referendum over 20 years ago, a cutting edge energy performance contracting program had been implemented. He noted that while due to lack of state incentives, implementation of alternative energy sources is not as cost effective as it is in other states there are still opportunities available. One of the District's objectives for the coming year is the implementation of another phase of the Guaranteed Energy Performance Contract, which has been approved by the Superintendent to complement the Bond. Mr. Torrens indicated this would be the right tool to advance energy efficiency on a guaranteed basis, as any energy efficient projects must be paid from the savings.

Mr. Carvalho welcomed the Committee and thanked them for their contribution to ensuring the viability and accuracy of the Bond rollout. He pointed out that the Committee had received a draft of the Second Annual Report. One of the many items detailed was the analysis related to Phase 1 of the Disparity Study. Mr. Carvalho indicated he had found some elements within the report to be troubling, resulting in the decision to both re-verify the findings via an audit by the Independent Chief Auditor, and commissioning a third party expert to conduct the equivalent of a mini Disparity Study specific to one of the four areas declared under the draft report. This mini study would be finalized soon. As promised, the District was moving in the direction of bringing forth Board-approved policies and restoring some MWBE features to protect and augment opportunity while not slowing down the implementation of the Bond.

Mr. Carvalho noted he would expect the report and associated implementing recommendations to materialize within 45 to 60 days, and indicated he felt the

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community would be satisfied with the results. Additionally, the Second Annual Report also detailed completion of projects, projects underway, projects being commissioned, and lastly a reduction of between a year to a year and a half of the Bond implementation timeline.

Mr. Carvalho then spoke of some of the challenges including the escalating cost of construction, mainly driven by private sector activity. As such, the District's objective would continue to be to move ahead aggressively and attempt to secure favorable prices. He noted that at the June Board meeting alone, there would be 9 commissioning items for approval, including commissioning of the first African American prime architectural firm in many years. Another example of a promise made and a promise kept.

Mr. Carvalho then reminded the Committee of the on-going replacement of the Miami Norland Senior high School, the largest single investment in the GOB, a \$40 million project. Also noteworthy on the opposite side of the county is funding for Miami Palmetto Senior High School, which although not originally slated to be a replacement, with input from the Village's Mayor and community feedback, coupled with availability of additional funding, had evolved into a major replacement project. Mr. Carvalho expressed his satisfaction with the progress made, but noted the urgency in remaining ahead of the curve. He thanked the Committee on behalf of Miami-Dade County Public Schools for all their work on the Committee.

Mr. Martinez then described his visit to a school during the Adopt a School program. He noted that although there a scope and budget are created pursuant to an inventory of needs undertaken prior to the Bond's inception, often, after on-site visits, modifications in scope and/or increased funds are warranted. Mr. Carvalho concurred and added that there have also been instances where the opposite was the case allowing the surplus after Board approval to be reinvested into other projects.

The Chair then directed the Committee's attention to Mr. Torrens for the project updates.

Mr. Torrens provided an Update on the Year-1 Project Rollout as follows:

- 32 projects with substantial completed
- 34 in Construction
- 2 in bidding
- M.A.S.T. @ Virginia Key to be completed and occupied by August 2015
- Miami Norland Senior replacement to be completed and occupied in August 2016
- An additional 23 smaller projects were accelerated containing critical scope such as air conditioning, portable removal, and playgrounds;
- Nearly two thirds of the accelerated projects added to Year 1 have been completed

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Mr. Torrens then provided an Update on the Year-2 Project Rollout as follows:

- Total of 79 projects
- 54 assigned to Small/ Micro business firms
 - 10 in construction
 - 41 in design or bidding
 - remainder in scoping
- All projects in the \$1-\$2 million grouping in construction
- Projects over \$2 million
 - 15 with contracts assigned
 - 1 in Construction

Mr. Torrens reminded the Committee that the addition project at D.A.S.H., previously discussed by the Committee, was presented to the Board requesting authorization to explore more significant opportunities in the Design District, where the school is located. The current school site is a significant real estate asset. The possibility of building a new school is being explored. Mr. Torrens expressed his enthusiasm over the prospect of a new building with any additional revenue generated from the real estate asset to be redirected to other needs. Mr. Martinez inquired if the students, teachers and parents have been kept informed. Mr. Torrens indicated this would be an on-going conversation with the stakeholders.

Mr. Torrens next provided an Update on the Year-3 Project Rollout as follows:

- 54 projects total
 - 37 projects over \$2million
 - Solicitations grouped as previously discussed
 - 2 project groups reserved for Small/Micro Sheltered Markets businesses
 - A/E solicitations for the first groups issued in March
 - Solicitations for remaining projects to continue until completion

Mr. Torrens noted the grouping model has been very successful in distributing work to qualified firms. The first group of Year-3 project solicitations consisting of 9 projects worth approximately \$31 million resulted in the following:

- 7 different prime Architects selected
- All are Small/Micro Businesses and MWBE certified
- All projects had additional sub-consultants goals for Small/Micro businesses of at least 15%
- 14 different sub-consultants involved
- First Certified Asian American firm

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Mr. Torrens specifically referred to a notable achievement directly resulting from the Small/Micro business program, i.e. two firms first commissioned as Small/Micro Businesses for projects under \$1 million, now successful in competing for larger projects between \$3 and \$5 million: Carty Architects and Nyarko Architects. Mr. Torrens asked Mr. Nyarko and Ms. Carty, in attendance, to share their experience working with the School Board on the GOB program. Mr. Nyarko expressed his satisfaction with the program's implementation noting that it has been a tremendous experience with additional great opportunities in the future. Ms. Carty stated that the format being used by M-DCPS in grouping projects is much more efficient from the responders' end, adding that proposal preparation is an extensive process. She further noted that this new method is a game changer which will allow many more additional firms to become involved. Mr. Torrens then informed the Committee that Small Business Architects and Contractors meet with the District on a quarterly basis, where they provide recommendations for implementation, and which M-DCPS takes into consideration. Ms. Carty attested to this noting their input at these quarterly chats is taken into consideration.

Dr. Donath asked how working with government contracts may impact the firms' ability to compete in the private sector, and whether it is advantageous. Ms. Carty noted that while the impact and advantages may not be seen immediately she rather expects to see the gains in the long run because building a portfolio is crucial to a small firm like Carty Architecture. It certainly has a positive effect when it comes to hiring workforce. Mr. Nyarko agreed with Ms. Carty and also commended the work accomplished by the OEO. Mr. Torrens pointed many of the design professionals recognize the importance of reaching or exceeding the established participation goals set forth by the District.

Mr. Torrens moved ahead to Program Adjustments. He explained that up for the Committee's consideration was a recommendation to reallocate funds in the amount of \$391K for completion of additional critical work at South Hialeah Elementary. Mr. Martinez asked that this item be addressed later in the meeting.

Mr. Torrens next provided an Update on the Year-4 Project Rollout as follows:

- 50 projects total
- 39 projects over \$2 million
- Solicitations to be issued through groupings
- Sheltered Market opportunities to be developed in conjunction with OEO
 - Construction delivery methods to be based on the previously approved protocol: CM @ Risk for renovations/ work on existing sites and Hard Bid for new construction projects
- 11 projects under \$2 million (AEPC) already assigned

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Mr. Martinez recognized Dr. Marta Perez, Board Member, who had joined the meeting. Mr. Torrens introduced the School Board Treasurer, Mr. Leo Fernandez, who provided an update on the GOB financials. Mr. Fernandez advised the District is watching the cash flow needs closely so as not to impose an unnecessary additional burden on the taxpayers. Cash flow projections were presented and voted on by the Treasury Advisory Committee and the Board, resulting in a recommendation to issue an additional \$200 million. Mr. Fernandez indicated the goal is to go into the market in July and secure the lowest possible interest point. Taxpayers will see a gradual increase in their taxes of roughly \$18 per every \$100,000. Ms. Wyllie asked what the term would be and Mr. Fernandez indicated it would likely be 30 years. Mr. Rubin asked about the prior Bond and Mr. Fernandez noted the current tax burden is \$10 per \$100,000 at this time.

Dr. Feldman, Board Vice-Chair, noted that during the previous Bond referendum a concern had been that funds would be depleted prior to concluding the program. He pointed out that costs are expected to rise as the program is rolled, and suggested that consideration be given to the possibility of borrowing a larger sum of money but not using it until necessary. Dr. Feldman's concern was over schools slated to begin work during the latter years of the Bond. Mr. Torrens assured that the District has accelerated the pace as much as reasonably possible in an effort to reduce the impact of rising construction costs on future projects. Mr. Rubin inquired if instead of reallocating excess money early in the Bond, it may prove more beneficial to expend each project's funding, and later at the end of the Bond program, go back and finish any extra work with whatever funds are available at that time. Mr. Torrens noted that this would more than likely result in significantly higher spending because of inflation in construction costs among other factors. Mr. Torrens reminded the Committee of its decision to balance each Year's fund prior to moving to the next year, and added that he is open to any different recommendations from the Committee. Ms. Wyllie pointed out that costs are driven from supply and demand, and added that the industry constantly fluctuates.

Mr. Martinez moved ahead and pointed out to the Committee had received the first draft of the Second Annual Report and asked that any member of the Committee who has any questions present them as soon as possible to the Office of School facilities so that they can be addressed properly. Ms. Fazzino suggested that the Committee forward any questions or recommendations via email to gob@dadeschools.net by July 15 so that staff will have ample time to make any needed adjustments and subsequently allow the Committee to take action at the September 8 Bond Advisory Committee Meeting .

Mr. Martinez reminded the Committee to the School Adoption Program already in place, and encouraged the Committee members to participate if they haven't already done so.

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He described his recent visit to Kenwood Elementary, an older campus of Dade-County, and voiced the importance of meeting with staff members of the school administration and students to get a better feel for the needs of the school. Mr. Torrens advised the Committee that forms were available for those interested in participating in the program. He informed the Committee that when should they decide to visit a school they would be accompanied by members of the Project Management team from the Office of Capital Improvement Projects to meet with the Principal and to help get a better understanding of the scope of work for the project in question. He reiterated the importance of the Committee's feedback. Reverend Revuelta shared his experience visiting Shenandoah Elementary and conveyed how impressed he was by the Bond work there. Dr. Donath spoke about his visit to Ojus Elementary, a campus his children attended, and added he would be returning once the work is further along. Mr. Dawsey shared his experience visiting Phyllis Ruth Miller_Elementary, noting that this project in particular is focused on infrastructure; specifically upgrades to the media room, sound system and the AC system.

Ms. Martell noted that after her visits to JFK and North Miami Beach Senior she felt further improvements would be needed. Mr. Martinez advised her to feel free to always be vocal about any input she may have in respects to the Bond rollout. Ms. Williamson asked for clarification as to what schools can be adopted and Mr. Martinez advised she could choose to visit schools other Committee members have already chosen. Mr. Torrens offered to sit with Ms. Williamson to further discuss details of the adoption program as well as details of whichever school(s) she may have in mind. Ms. Metellus suggested that future agendas for the Bond Advisory Committee include a segment for the Committee to share these types of experiences with each other. Mr. Martinez agreed and believes it's a worthwhile idea.

Mr. Williams began his update for the Office of Economic Opportunity by sharing that between April of 2013 and June 4th, 2015, 659 firms had been certified by the District. He added that the department is constantly striving to develop strategies to increase this number. A remarkable accomplishment was the consistency in terms of participation in the race neutral program noting that approximately 90% of the companies in the program are minority owned. Ms. Wyllie proposed that a column be added to report number of people actually employed or contracted. Mr. Williams added that compliance staff in the OEO is compiling this information for both prime contractors and sub-contractors, which may also be broken down by trade and industry. He noted there were almost 100 certified SBE sub-contracting firms participating in the Bond program.

Frazier noted that as a private citizen rather than extract information, it should instead be provided directly to him. Mr. Torrens confirmed that everything viewed and discussed in the Bond Advisory Committee can be viewed on the website, and added that Mr. Williams would make sure to transmit information directly to Mr. Frazier and the SBE Advisory Committee going forward. Ms. Metellus requested that a summary update be provided to the SBE Committee, detailing what has been done, what has been spent, etc. Mr. Williams stated that this request was previously made, and the District had already provided a response.

Mr. Dotres informed the Committee that the delayed information referenced by Mr. Frazier, specifically the expenditures, had been gathered, but the Department wanted to double check the data and ensure it is solid. Just earlier in the day, a meeting took place with the Chief Auditor where it was concluded that the District will soon be presenting specific data points to the public. Some of these data points are as follows:

- General expenditures; 2013-14, 2014-15 & year to date
- Procurement commitments; 2013-14, 2014-15 & year to date
- P-Card expenses; 2013-14, 2014-15, year to date
- Charges incurred by schools; 2013-14, 2014-15, year to date

Mr. Dotres assured the Committee that as soon as the auditors have verified the information and the Superintendent authorizes its release, the information will be released.

Mr. Martinez excused himself and reminded the Committee that the next Committee meeting would take place September 9 and asked the Committee members to please submit any input on the Report to District Staff prior to then. He asked that Mr. Anthony Dawsey take his place for the remainder of the meeting.

Ms. Martell inquired if a location had been determined for the new secondary facility located in North Dade Miami-Dade and Mr. Torrens responded that it had not. She also asked where the new budget for each of the schools could be viewed and Mr. Torrens directed her to the M-DCPS website. Ms. Martell wanted to specifically locate yearly operating budgets for each school and Mr. Fernandez advised that this information is provided to the parents of every student on a yearly basis via written publication.

Mr. Dawsey requested a motion to approve the endorsement of the reallocation of funds as shown from a Year-1 contingency year to a Year-1 project under critical needs.

Mr. Dawsey asked that Mr. Torrens elaborate prior to the Committee voting. He explained that South Hialeah Elementary School is a school built in the 1920's, with a major addition built approximately 8 years ago. Once the GOB construction commenced, it was determined that there were greater needs relative to the plumbing and infrastructure for the 6 restrooms than originally envisioned which required an additional \$391,000. There is funding available from prior reallocations totaling \$398,000. The request was to reallocate \$391,000 of that balance to this Year-1 project in order to complete the work over the summer.

Mr. Dawsey requested a motion, which was made by Mr. Alan Rubin, seconded by Ms. Marlen Martell and passed unanimously.

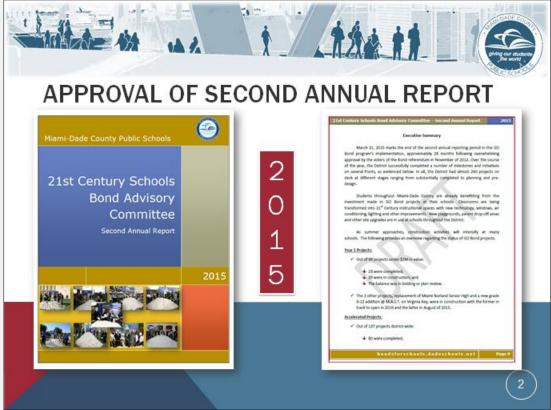

LOCAL PREFERENCE

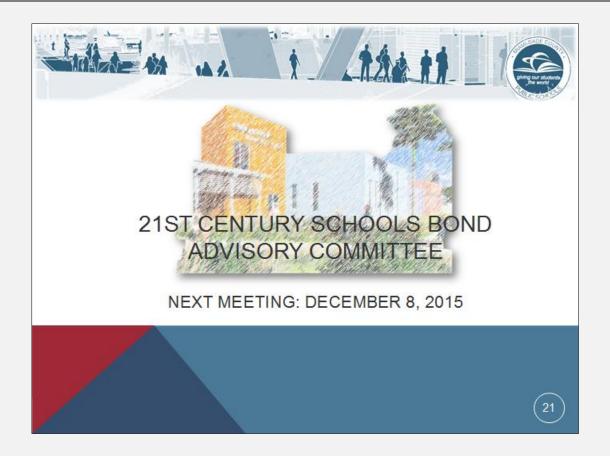

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE 21ST CENTURY SCHOOLS BOND ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES – October 13, 2015

The 21st Century Schools Bond Advisory Committee (Committee) met on October 13 2015 in Conference Room 916 of the School Board Administration Building. Chairman Martinez called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

Mr. Martinez called the meeting to order and immediately confirmed that there was a quorum present. He explained that the reason for the special meeting was to vote on the Second Annual Report, which was provided to the Committee via email several months prior. The Committee was unable to vote on the report at the previous meeting due to lack of a quorum. Mr. Martinez then recognized Board Members Dr. Feldman and Dr. Perez-Wurtz in attendance.

Mr. Martinez shared that the Committee members were given the opportunity to submit questions and remarks in respects to the report. Mr. Torrens noted that responses to the Committee's inquiries had been addressed and incorporated in the document. Mr. Martinez asked that Mr. Torrens provide a brief synopsis prior to the action on the report.

Mr. Torrens indicated that the Second Annual report includes the status of all the Year 1 and Year 2 projects through the end of the reporting period, which is the end of March

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2015. This includes but is not limited to expenditures, current project phase status (i.e. planning, design, or construction phase), results of the incorporation of Small and Micro Business Enterprises, and a follow up report by the OEO. Mr. Del Busto inquired if any major changes were incorporated to the report as previously mentioned. Mr. Torrens pointed out that there were no major changes from what had been previously disseminated.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to approve the endorsement of the Second Annual Report. The motion was made by Mr. Juan Del Busto, seconded by Ms. Carol Graham Wyllie.

Mr. Wallace apologized for not attending the previous meeting. He then asked if the majority of the Committee was satisfied with the results of the Disparity Study and the actions being taken as a result of it. He made reference to a Committee meeting which took place earlier in 2015 where some general complaints had been made with respect to underutilization of MBE local sub-contractors, and asked if the Committee was satisfied with the efforts put forth to address the concern. Mr. Torrens confirmed that concerns had been addressed and appropriate actions taken. The original Disparity Study warranted a review of sub-contractors data by the M-DCPS Chief Auditor, which was followed by the commissioning of a third party who conducted a follow-up study specific to sub-contracting. It was determined that disparity was present at the sub-contracting level. These findings were presented at the September School Board meeting, where a vote ensued, initiating the adoption of a new MWBE policy. As a result, a new program was developed and up for a vote at the next School Board Meeting.

Mr. Martinez made reference to an article published by Mr. Alberto Carvalho, Superintendent of Schools, and Committee member Mr. Willard T. Fair related to the topic at hand. Mr. Fair expressed that the Superintendent and the Office of School Facilities have addressed and resolved his concerns to the parties' mutual satisfaction. He also articulated that the manner in which M-DCPS remedied the concerns brought forth were exemplary. Mr. Wallace praised both Mr. Fair and the Superintendent, and agreed that the collaboration was praiseworthy. He pointed out that since he first worked with M-DCPS 25 years ago he can clearly see positive changes and evolving attitudes, and thanked the Committee for allowing him to be part of it.

Mr. Carvalho thanked both Mr. Wallace and Mr. Fair for probing into the issue of diversity and following up on whether action had been taken as intended. He avowed that the process has been an honest, hard hitting and transparent one. Some root cause issues were identified, and solutions were negotiated not only for the present but for years to come. A substantial number of procedures and practices have been changed: prompt payment issues have been addressed, Diversity Training has been implemented, and assuring that Prime Contractors are being held to M-DCPS type standards in terms of what the expectation is of sub-contractors. There has been a significant improvement with regard to MBE involvement. Within 3 years, African

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American owned entity participation rate has risen from less than 2% to 9%. Mr. Carvalho anticipates that these percentages will continue to grow.

Mr. Carvalho educated the Committee on the magnitude of projects being rolled out at the October 14 School Board Meeting. An estimated \$45 million worth of projects are scheduled to be presented to the Board with vast representation of diversity in terms of sub-contractors, even prior to the implementation of the aforementioned policies. Mr. Carvalho indicated that the expectation of diversity is already present, which is a huge advancement. Now that there are contractual guarantees with specific race and gender goals, workforce cooperation is necessary. He stressed the importance of job fairs in order to connect our communities to jobs. Mr. Carvalho concluded by advising the Committee that at this time we are in the preliminary phase of the Disparity Study Phase II, dealing specifically with Maintenance and Procurement expenditures. He added that it is the District's goal to implement the policies discussed for all M-DCPS expenditures, not just GOB related expenses.

Mr. Martinez confirmed that there were no further questions with respect to the motion to approve the endorsement of the Second Annual Report, and after requesting a vote from the Committee, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Martinez requested a motion to approve the Minutes of the June 9, 2015 meeting. The motion was made by Mr. Paul Wallace, seconded by Mr. Jack Lowell and passed unanimously.

Mr. Torrens provided an Update on the Year-1 Project Rollout as follows:

- 58 projects completed
- 10 projects in construction
- Miami Norland Senior High replacement to be completed August 2016
- M.A.S.T. @ Virginia Key fully operational as of August 2015
 - public school which still reserves its magnet program
 - providing relief for overcrowded Key Biscayne K-8

Mr. Torrens provided an Update on the Year-2 Project Rollout as follows:

- Total of 79 projects
- 54 projects were Sheltered Market for S/MBE firms
 - 3 completed
 - 26 in construction
 - 25 projects in planning, design, or bidding stage
- All projects between \$1-2 million are all in construction
- Projects \$2 million and over have all been assigned and are in various stages of construction, bidding or design

Mr. Torrens next provided an Update on the Year-3 Project Rollout as follows:

- Total of 54 projects plus accelerated scope

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- 37 projects over \$2 million
 - 17 commissioning's taking place tomorrow
- Most projects under \$1 million are in design, with a few projects in the scoping stage
- 168 smaller accelerated projects
 - Immediate impact, making it necessary to accelerate
 - Includes playgrounds portable removal, roofing and air conditioning
 - 111 projects completed
 - 19 projects in construction
 - 38 projects in design

Mr. Torrens proceeded to detail the GOB expenditures to date, indicating that to date the District has exceeded the \$200 million mark; \$158 million in Construction, \$47 million in Technology and almost \$100 million under contract as of September of 2015. Mr. Lowell inquired if there was a slide representing the balance. Mr. Torrens confirmed that it does exist, noting that the Office of School of Facilities works closely with the Treasurer to track this information. He also noted that the pace of work will be increasing as Year 3, 4 and 5 projects roll out.

Mr. Torrens continued the presentation with the GOB Program Adjustments portion. He displayed a slide itemizing completed schools with balances available, as well as GOB unallocated reserves, totaling \$1,611,450. Also included on the same slide were projects with unfunded critical scopes. Mr. Torrens explained that one of the recommendations being presented to the Committee today was a request to endorse reallocation of funds as shown from substantially completed/financially reconciled projects to other projects with unfunded critical scope, and from reserves to undistributed contingency for future allocation. The amount being recommended for reallocation to additional projects is \$1.2 million, with \$390,000 to be kept in reserve.

Mr. Martinez reminded the Committee that a protocol was established in a prior meeting in order to be able to discuss project issues such as these, even though the Committee will not be asked to vote on them. Mr. Wallace queried if the endorsement of reallocation of funds was part of today's vote which took place earlier. Mr. Martinez reiterated that this information is so that the Committee can remain apprised and also be given the opportunity to voice recommendations on GOB related issues. He indicated that he didn't believe the Committee is in a position to vote on a recommended action, seeing the level of detail which goes into these types of decisions. Mr. Fair agreed. Ms. Wyllie questioned whether there was a possibility of depleting funds prior to the Bond's completion due to rising industry costs. Mr. Martinez assured that the monies are being managed diligently.

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Mr. Williams began by informing the Committee of two significant policy changes. On October 14, the final reading would be made for Policy 6320.02; Small, Micro and Minority Business Enterprise Program; and Policy 6320.05; Local Business Preference. Changes were made to these policies based on the findings of the Euquant report, accepted at the prior Board Meeting as it relates to African American sub-contractors in the construction industry. Based on those findings, policy was modified to include providing preferences and provisions for historically underutilized groups, including the African American population within Miami-Dade County.

Mr. Williams added that this also provides clarification to the responsibilities of the OEO, including enforcing the implementation of measures developed under new Board Policy 6320.06; Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in Business Operations and Practices. This policy, a firsthand policy spearheaded by the Superintendent and multiple District Offices, is an effort to implement a Procurement practice that is not only looking at diversity as a whole, but also looking at inclusiveness within the Miami-Dade community in terms of new companies joining the process. One of the results of the Diversity and inclusion Policy will be the implementation of live in-person mandatory diversity training for all individuals involved in the Procurement process. Mr. Williams stressed the level of community input that went into constructing the RFP to select the entity who will be conducting these trainings, including the collaboration of the NAACP.

Mr. Lowell inquired if there are geographical preferences included in this policy. Mr. Williams clarified that there is not, and that the policy is with relation to the understanding of our different groups in terms of inclusiveness in the Procurement policy. The Disparity Study Phase 1 shows that the market area, as it relates to construction and construction professional services is limited to the tri-county area. He added that if history repeats itself, Phase 2 of the Disparity Study will show that the majority of our goods are purchased nation-wide. Mr. Lowell asked if, since the money to purchase materials is only coming from Miami-Dade County, there could be a way to spend more of those dollars within the same County. Mr. Williams explained that one of the initiatives being taken to keep the money within the Community is the implementation of the SBE program. This particular program is restricted to Miami-Dade County. Due to legalities, the MBE program cannot be limited to one County. That being said, Mr. Williams advised that as of recently, numbers show that we have a 90% participation of MWBE in our local program, 32% of that being African American participation. He noted the District has been successful in finding opportunities to retain dollars in our community, and assured the Committee that they are finding every way to maximize participation of all groups. Mr. Torrens added that M-DCPS also has a Local Vendor Preference Policy in place. Mr. Martinez requested that Mr. Lowell's question be highlighted in the meeting minutes.

Mr. Del Busto stated that he considers the procedure in place to have everyone sign off on the Diversity policy a great one, and believes it should be signed yearly to keep the information fresh on everyone's mind. Mr. Williams agreed. He hopes to extend these trainings to school sites in the future.

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Mr. Williams went on to discuss the changes which authorize the Superintendent to develop Affirmative Initiative and Incentive Programs in an effort to increase SBE and MWBE sub-contractor participation. He felt it was important to highlight that the Facilities Department recently rolled out a pilot program as it relates to CC&A (CM @ Risk and Professional Services for A&E). Revisions were made based on these new policy changes which incorporate more diversity and inclusion in those processes. This program will take effect as of the next Solicitation. He added that a training session was provided for both Architects and CM's as it relates to said policy. Mr. Williams believes this shows exemplary commitment from the District to constantly try to find ways to include diversity and inclusiveness in its practices.

Mr. Torrens interjected and stated that an incentive given to Prime Architects and Prime Contractors is a point system in which they accrue additional points in their evaluations if they promote diversity within their teams. Mr. Williams identified another policy revision in place stating that firms will be held legally accountable for falsifying any information. He assured the Committee that the OEO will be thoroughly reviewing all information brought forth and will be investigating any instance of possible fraud.

Mr. Williams advised that the OEO Inaugural Report is being finalized. He reminded the Committee that at a prior Committee meeting, the Inspector General asked about the numbers for the fiscal year. Mr. Williams clarified that the minority spend for the 2013-2014 fiscal year for our MWBE certified minorities was \$55 million. It increased to \$150 million in the 2014-2015 fiscal year. Mr. Martinez requested the percent of increase. Mr. Williams advised it was roughly a 9% increase. He explained that these dollar amounts represent funds actually dispersed within that fiscal year. He wanted to clarify that there are different ways data is tracked and categorized; the accrual of payments made, expenditures or encumbrances such as Purchase Orders issued for amounts that are not necessarily expended within the fiscal year, and term contracts spread out over multiple years. Mr. Williams stressed that they focus on payments at hand so that a true picture is given to the Community.

Mr. Williams then noted that Purchase Orders issued to date for the 2015-2016 fiscal year have already reached a total of \$40 million. It shows an upward trend of funds being spent in the minority community and the dedication the District has to the programs and policies in place. Mr. McGhee inquired if the Purchase Orders in question are from the Procurement side of this process. Mr. Williams confirmed. Mr. McGhee stated that most of the information is focused on the Construction, and he is curious to learn more about the Procurement aspect. Mr. Williams shared that he works closely with Procurement and that the Department participates in the OEO's Goal Setting Committee, giving them a vote when the Committee establishes preferences. He added that there has been an upward trend in terms of the contracts and initiatives being taken on the goods and services side, and assured that an aggressive approach is being applied. Mr. McGhee expressed his interest in additional details, particularly in the total amount reserved for Procurement. Ms. Judy Marte advised that no funds are allocated to Procurement. \$100 million was reserved for technology, and the remaining funds are

apportioned for Capital. She offered to present data points on the budgets for goods and services at the next Committee meeting. Mr. Martinez asked that she also provide details on the balance of funds when she presents in December's Committee meeting. Mr. Williams concluded his presentation by thanking the Chief Auditor and his Staff for their efforts in ensuring the accuracy of the data being released. Mr. Martinez also thanked Mr. Montes de Oca, Chief Auditor. Mr. Montes de Oca took a moment to recognize Mr. McGhee. He pointed out that he was the genesis for the establishment of the minority goals because he was one of the first to voice his concerns during a presentation Mr. Montes de Oca made at a Committee meeting about 2 years ago.

Ms. Wyllie mentioned an email sent out detailing the schedule of GOB Ribbon Cutting events. Mr. Torrens elaborated, reiterating that we are at a point were 58 projects are now completed. He confirmed that to date there are 8 or 9 scheduled events, and there will be more to follow. These events are significant because they show the community the culmination of our work.

Mr. Williams informed the Committee of the Bonding and Financial Assistance Model Contractor Development Program, a 6-week session being held by the OEO. He added that even though there is only a small group of participants, they have attended consistently and benefited significantly. One firm has since secured a bond with the District's guidance.

Mr. Brian Williams provided an update on the Office of Economic Opportunity Outreach activities as follows:

Mr. Martinez inquired if any of the Committee members had visited any of their adopted schools. Mr. Rubin confirmed he had visited Ruth K. Broad/ Bay Harbor K-8. His initial concern was that the pre-Bond preliminary walk through was performed prior to the construction of the Middle School. When the security cameras were added to the scope of work, the Middle School portion of the school was not accounted for. Eventually, through collaboration with Dr. Karp's office, funding was allocated for the missing cameras. Mr. Rubin's second concern dealt with technology. He shared that through the fundraising of the PTA, the school was able to secure funding for the smart boards that they needed at the time, prior to the GO Bond's inception. Because of this, they only received 2 smart boards from GOB funding. Since then, a number of them have been damaged. Mr. Rubin asked if there was a possibility of allocating funds for technology since what they initially received was minimal. Another issue related to technology at Ruth K. Broad/ Bay Harbor K-8 related to laptops and tablets. Mr. Rubin believes they really never received a substantial amount of them and are currently waiting for 3 carts' worth of laptops. Ms. Marte stated that the order has been placed. Mr. Rubin asked when they are expected to arrive. Ms. Marte agreed to look into it. Mr. Martinez thanked Mr. Rubin and shared that he also made some recommendations

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after his visit to Kenwood K-8. Mr. Lowell thanked the Board for allowing the artists to occupy space to create their murals. He specified that the Jose de Diego Middle School mural looks fantastic.

Ms. Martel stated that she has noticed a disconnect between the Municipalities and the schools. She feels the cities are not providing students the technology required properly to do their work. Not for lack of resources, but because they are not aware of the issue. She made reference to a particular program that Middle School students log into. In order to access this particular program, software such as Javascript and Plug-In need to be installed. If the municipalities are not aware of the system requirements, students are not able to access the software in public libraries. Mr. Torrens assured Ms. Martel that he will have the M-DCPS IT Department reach out to make sure that systems are up to standard. Dr. Feldman voiced that he believed it was a great idea, adding that a list of needs should be generated and circulated to all the cities within Miami-Dade County, including unincorporated areas.

Ms. Williamson asked if she has been assigned schools for the Adopt the School Program. Mr. Martinez advised her to stay a few minutes after the meeting and speak to Ms. Tabitha Fazzino to select her schools. Ms. Williamson then inquired who she should contact when she has recommendations or concerns regarding a school. Mr. Martinez stated she can contact Mr. Jaime Torrens, Ms. Ana Rijo-Conde, or Ms. Tabitha Fazzino.

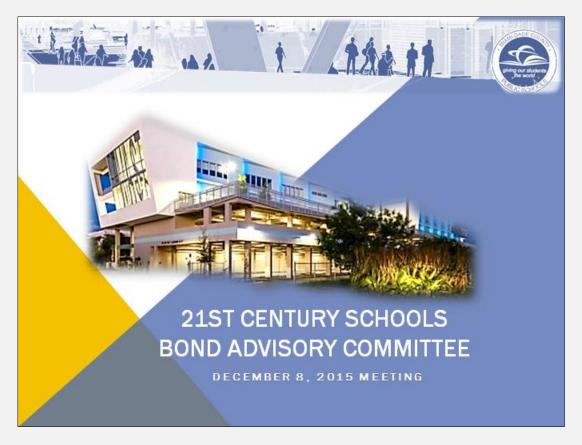

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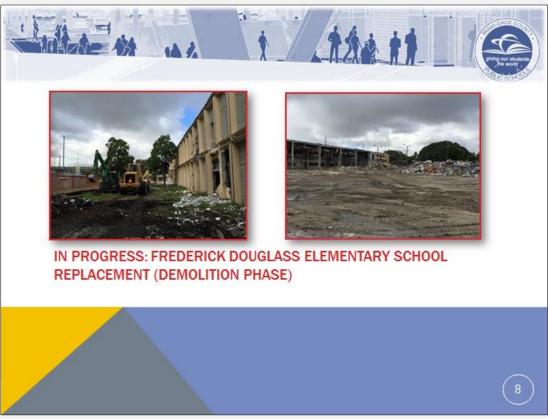




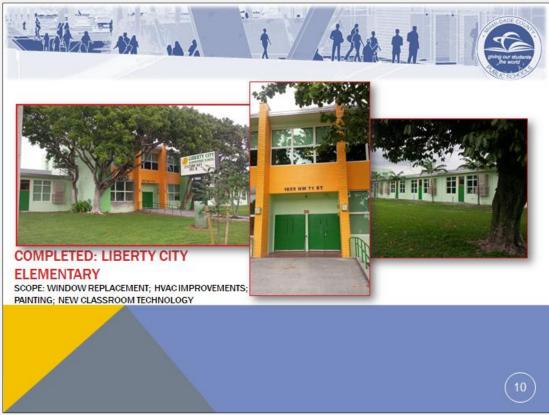








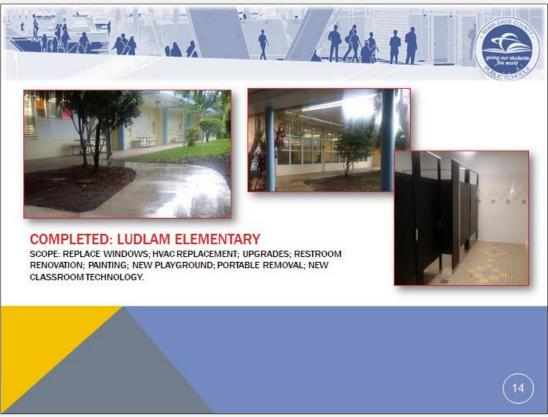






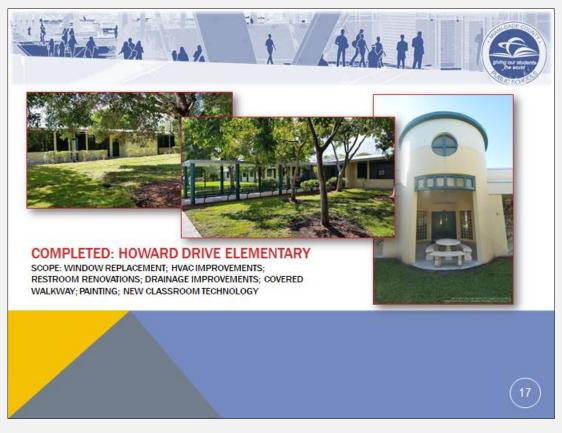


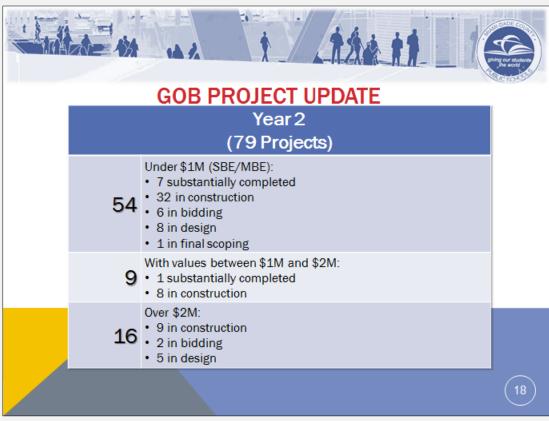


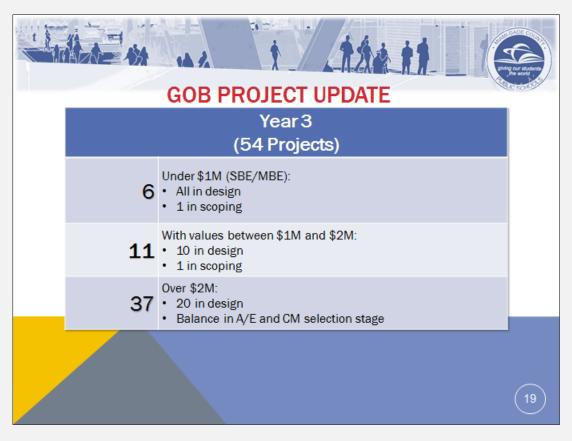


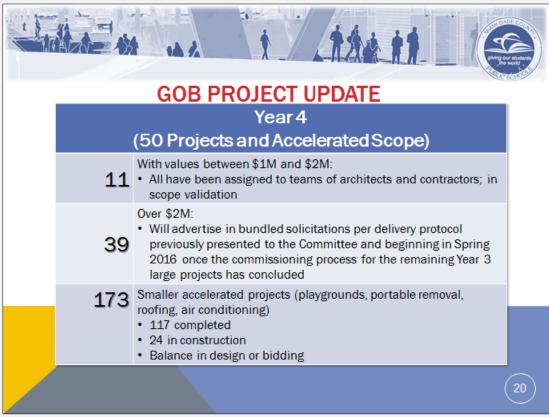








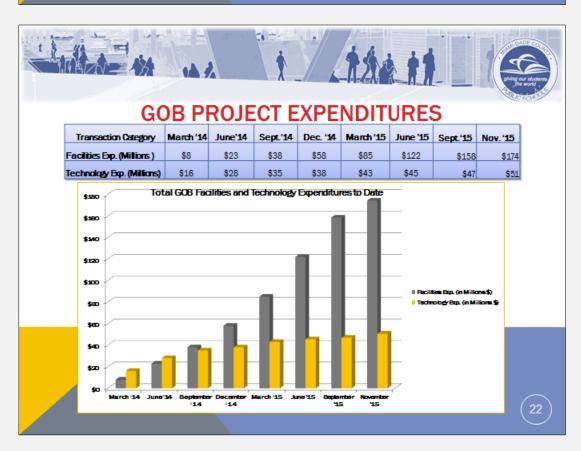


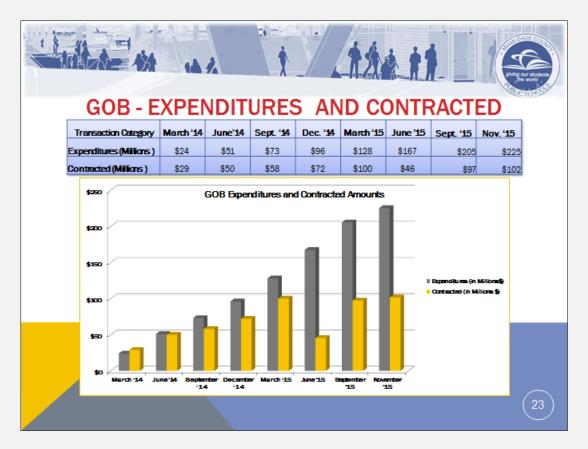




SCOPE VALIDATION CONSIDERATIONS

- As part of the scope validation process, particularly in connection with renovation projects with construction values over \$2M, Facilities has been collaborating with School Operations and/or other District departments, to identify 'best project approach' for particular schools
- Considerations include opportunities to achieve more cost effective solutions through different approaches, such as:
 - right-sizing of facilities (up or down) through select demolition and/or replacement rather than extensive renovations of older inventory; and
 - phasing of improvements to achieve better long-term results
- At the next Committee meeting, a few examples will be presented to illustrate the rationale being used to advance a specific solution that may differ from the originally envisioned plan but is expected to achieve better long-term results







- Moody's affirmed an "A1" rating for the outstanding Certificates of Participation (COP) and "Aa3" rating for the General Obligation Bonds (GOB), changing the District's outlook from negative to stable.
- The change in outlook reflects the 120% increase in general fund reserves for fiscal year 2014-15, and establishing a balanced 2015-16 budget, which maintains the fund balance at a level that meets the rating agencies requirements for a stable outlook.
- Moody's commended the District's demonstrated willingness to make budget adjustments to meet funding levels and stated that the district's management team is strong, tenured and implements industry-wide best practices. The report also mentioned that management's conservative budgeting practices support the likelihood of long-term financial stability.









GOB PROGRAM ADJUSTMENTS

- As projects are completed, a financial reconciliation is undertaken as part of the project close-out process
- This process creates opportunities for reallocation of funds from projects where all the scope was completed under budget to projects where the needs proved to be greater than what was provided in budget

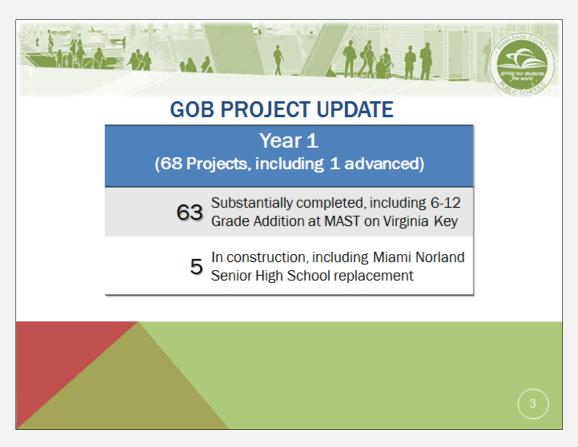
- Program adjustments to date represent a reallocation of approximately \$7.26M from projects with surplus funding to projects with unfunded critical needs with the vast majority pertaining to projects with values under \$2M
- This amount represents a modest 3.6% of approximately \$200M in expenditures to date and a large volume of mostly small projects (over 270 projects substantially completed or in construction, including accelerated scope projects)
- Years 3 through 5 of the GOB Program consist of larger projects (>\$2M) which provide more opportunity for adjustments within the existing budget allocations while still meeting critical needs; therefore, it is anticipated that the need for program adjustments will be diminished

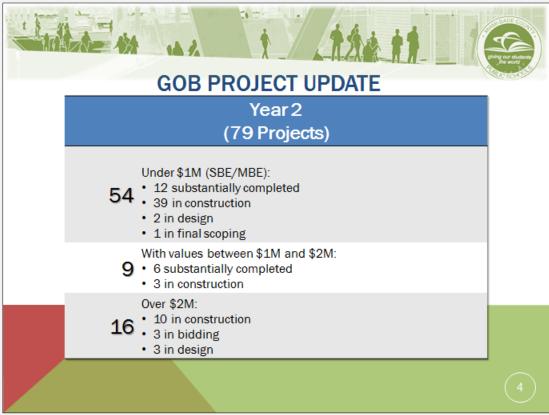


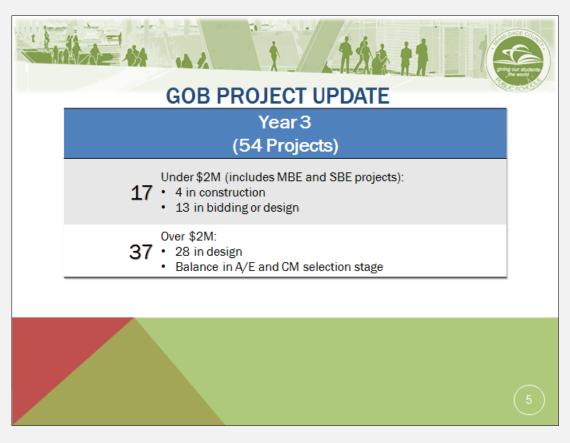


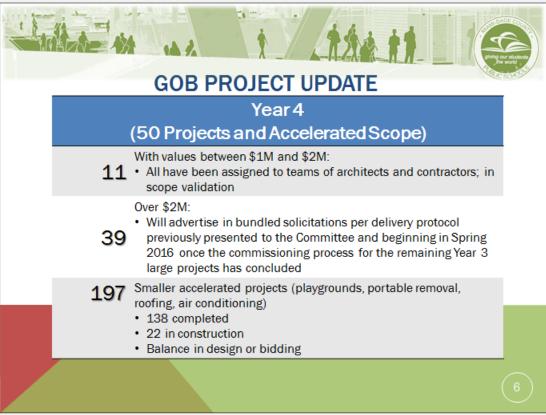


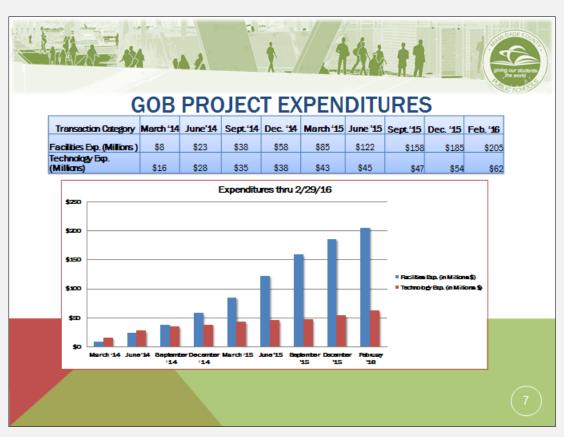


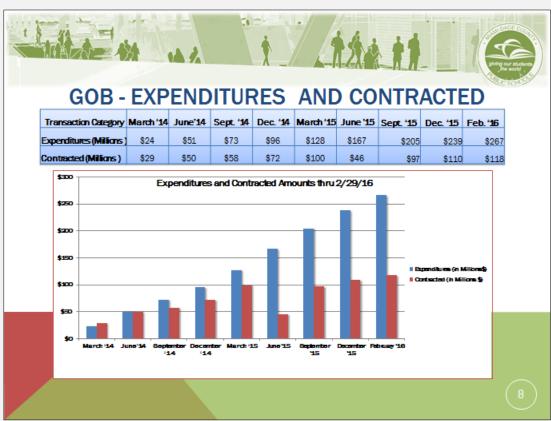
















- The primary goal behind the November 2012 GOB referendum was to secure funding to address the most critical needs in existing facilities and to upgrade instructional technology in classrooms District-wide
- The need for renovations at each school was derived from a deficiencies database and the level of criticality assigned to each deficiency



- Level of criticality was expressed as a Priority and then ranked from 1 (most critical) to 5 (least critical)
- This ranking was essential since the District's composite facilities need prior to GOB passage was estimated at approximately \$1.9B and the voter-authorized amount was \$1.2B, which included \$100M for technology





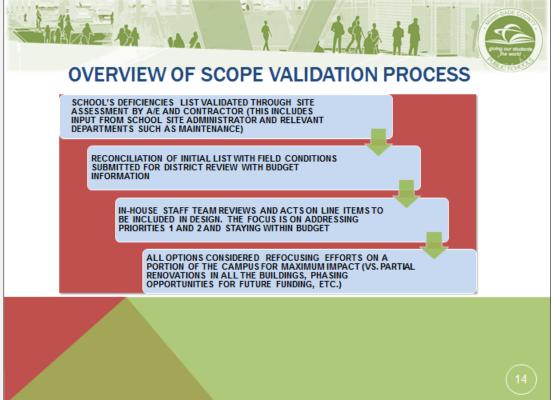

- Since passage of the GOB, the District's deficiencies database has been continually updated
- As deficiencies are corrected at each school they are documented in the database and likewise as new deficiencies are identified they are recorded
- Consequently, in certain instances, as GOB project scopes are validated prior to design, some of the original deficiencies no longer exist and/or additional critical needs have been identified







KENWOOD K-8 CAMPUS PROFILE

- The Kenwood K-8 campus includes multiple buildings with over 100,000 square feet of operational area. Approximately 60% of the school is less than 20 years old
- The buildings reflect different styles and time periods, with the original historic building dating back to 1927 and the most recent addition built in 2004
- The school is at approximately 94% utilization (capacity of 1,139 student stations and student enrollment of 1,067) which means there will be little available swing space during the renovation process (schedule and budget implications)

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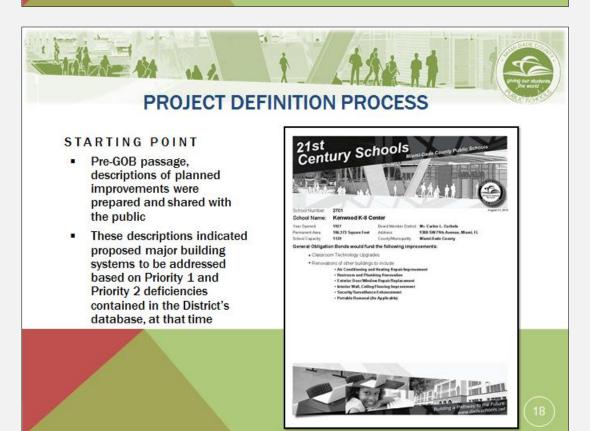


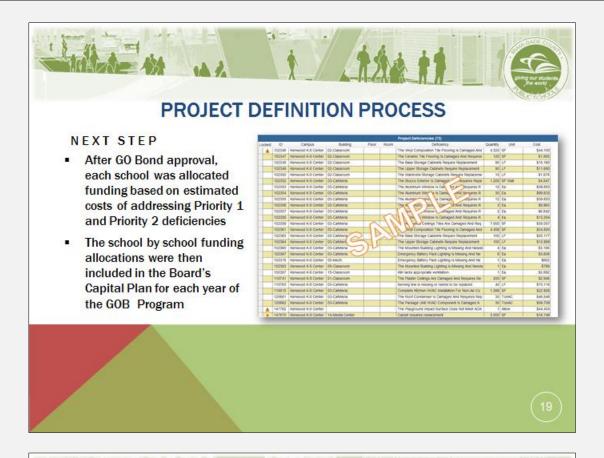


KENWOOD K-8 DEFICIENCIES AND INVESTMENT

M-DCPS HOSTS BOND PROJECT TOPPING OUT EVENT AT MAST ACADEMY

Superintendent of Schools Alberto M. Carvalho, District 6 School Board member Raquel Regalado, and community leaders gathered at MAST Academy today for a bond project Topping Out event resulting from the overwhelming voter approval of the \$1.2 billion General Obligation Bond. The GOB will be used to modernize and construct school buildings throughout the district, expand student capacity, enhance facility safety, and provide technology upgrades at all schools.

The event marks an important milestone in the history of the partnership between the School Board and the Village of Key Biscayne. With the approval of an Interlocal Agreement between the School Board and the Village, through which each party committed to the development of a new 1,100 student station facility for grades 6 through 12, a parking garage, and brand new state of the art playfields on the MAST Academy campus.

The project cost approximately \$20 million, which was split evenly between the two parties. The School Board allocated \$3.8 million to renovate the existing facility so as to ensure a cohesive and symbiotic campus. The architect for both the new facility and the renovations to the existing school is Silva Architects and the contractor is J. B. Pirtle Construction Co., Inc. The contractor has committed to a M/WBE utilization of almost 21% (combined African-American and Woman-owned firms) and local workforce utilization goal of 10%. Silva Architects is District-certified as M/WBE and SBE.

The MAST Academy project included an approximate 136,000 square foot 2-story classroom building over a 2-story parking garage housing 173 parking spaces. A separate 9,400 square foot building on the west side of the campus includes locker rooms, a weight room, and other PE support spaces.

Extensive use of glazing was provided to take advantage of the project's natural environment. Decks created by the parking structure will be utilized as outdoor learning and viewing spaces. The building's configuration incorporates an outdoor circulation space that plays off of the 2-story instructional spaces on the 3rd and 4th floors. These instructional spaces include general purpose and science classrooms, foreign language and computer labs, 2-D art lab, vocal music suite, and a satellite administration area.

Complementing the new capacity, improvements at the existing MAST Academy include the remodeling of an existing science lab space, a new science demo classroom and new science lab with associated support spaces, the remodeling and renovation of the existing robotics/engineering lab and updated infrastructure as well as the expansion and upgrading of the kitchen and dining areas and a new 2,000 square foot exterior covered dining area to accommodate the increased student population.

The School District also pledged to incorporate a place for the Ruppel Memorial, a tribute to a highly regarded MAST Academy teacher, in the campus master plan.
