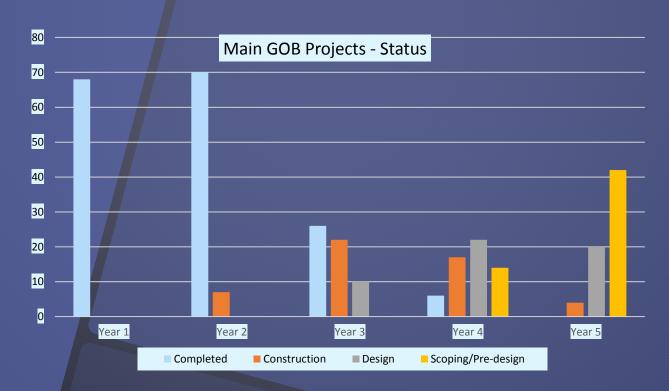

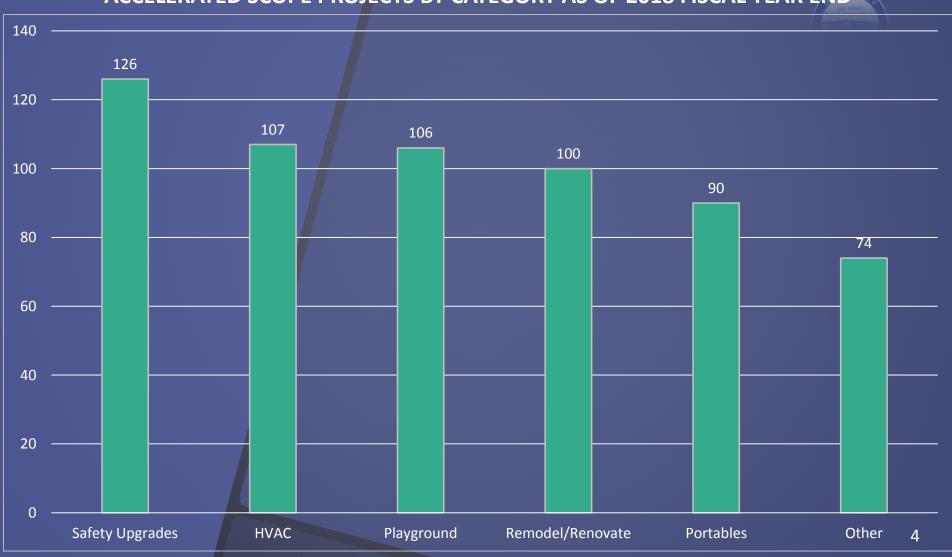

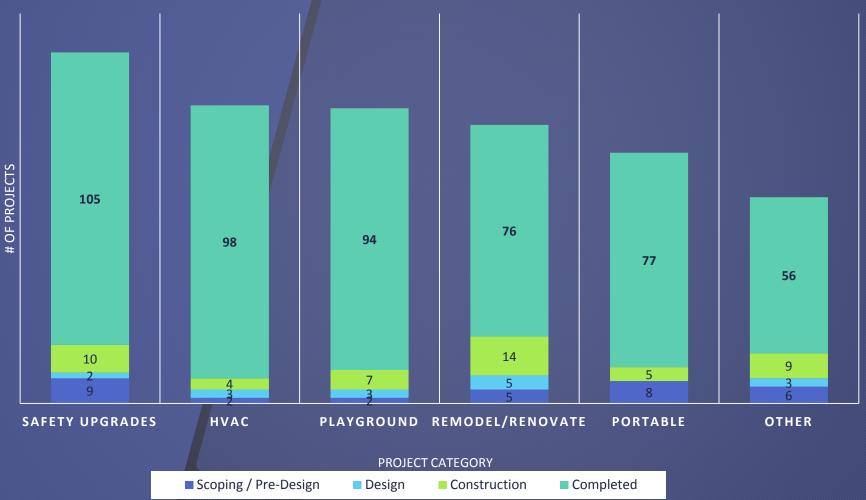
ACCELERATED SCOPE PROJECTS BY CATEGORY AS OF 2018 FISCAL YEAR END

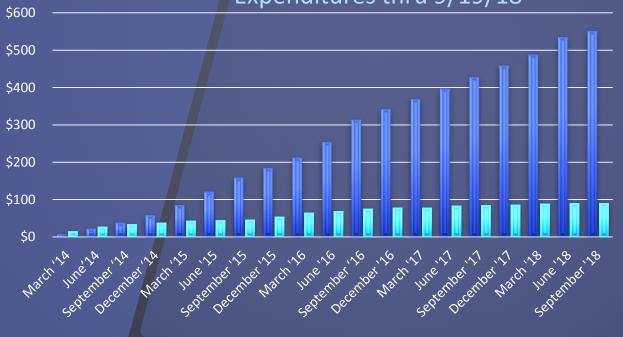

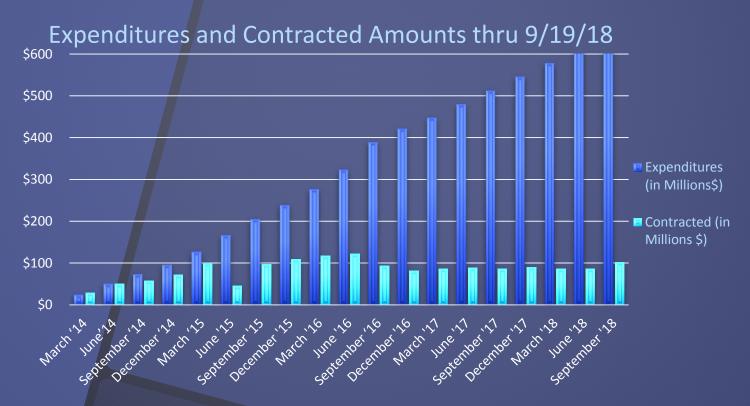

Executive Summary

June 30, 2018 marks the end of the fifth reporting period and this report covers the primary activities that occurred during the 2017-2018 fiscal year in the normal course of the GOB program's implementation. As more fully detailed in the various sections of the report, project delivery continued at a steady pace even in the face of increased competition for resources in the local construction market, as several other major construction programs in the tri-county area ramped up. This reporting period also saw considerable and sustained effort to engage Small and Micro Business Enterprise entities in the design and construction of GO Bond projects through targeted sheltered market solicitations, including incentivizing diversity and inclusion among project sub-consulting and sub-contracting teams.

Ultimately, the goal of the GO Bond program is to create learning environments appropriate for 21st century learning, including safety and security enhancements and state-of-the-art technology. Throughout the reporting period, critical scope continued to be accelerated to address immediate needs or facilitate project delivery, such as HVAC, playground replacements, roofing, portable removal and site restoration, installation or enhancement of Public Announcement and security camera systems, and through strategic project phasing.

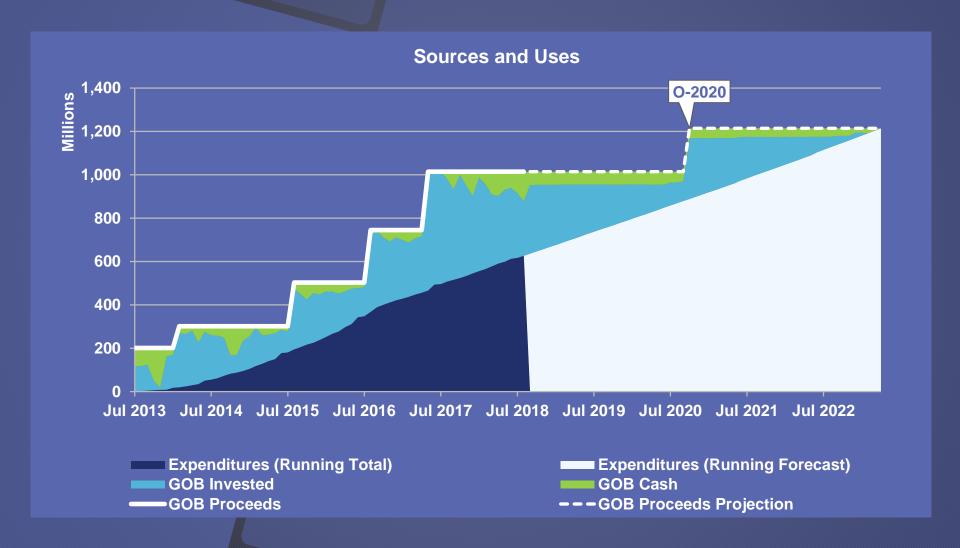

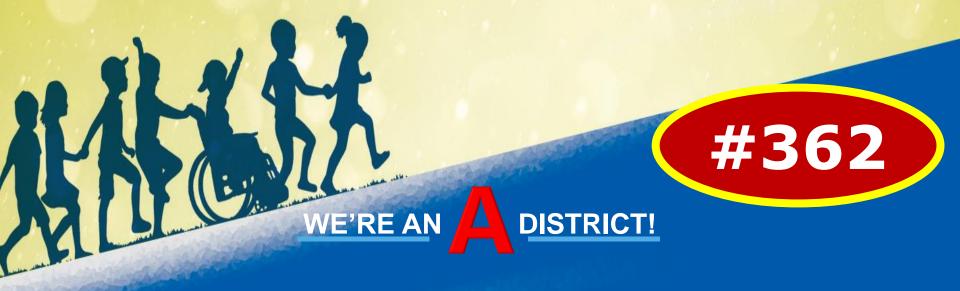

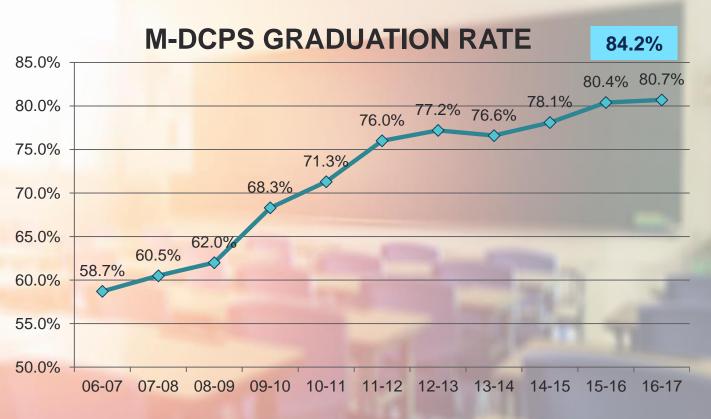


- FIRST-EVER "A" rating for the school district.

Increased Graduation Rates

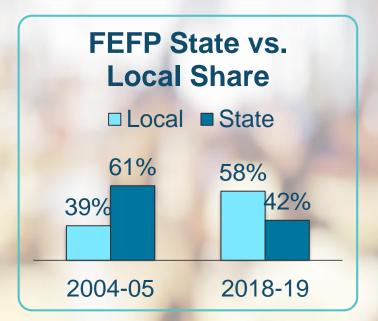




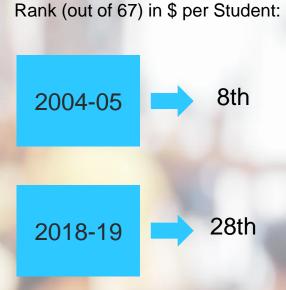

Challenges from Legislative Session

SCHOOL SAFETY LAW

- The District must assign police officers at each school.
 - 110 Miami-Dade Schools Police officers presently at school sites.
 - Approximately 220 more Miami-Dade Schools Police officers are needed.
- The District is currently partnering with local municipalities to provide an officer at all school sites; municipalities cannot bear cost indefinitely.

ENHANCED SAFETY AND SECURITY MEASURES

M-DCPS has implemented a number of safety enhancements and augmented security procedures in all schools. These include:

- School safety risk/threat assessments
- Mandatory ID use and visitor ID systems
- Reduced entry points to schools
- Classroom doors locked at all times
- Enhanced school security supervision with new and strict performance directives, including uniforms
- Continued use of random metal detection and K-9 sweeps at school-sponsored events
- Enhanced video surveillance and information-sharing capabilities to gather actionable data





TEACHERS LEAVING THE PROFESSION

- Nationally, approximately 8% of teachers exit the profession annually.
 - The South has larger turnover rates than the Northeast, Midwest, and West where states tend to offer higher pay, smaller class sizes, and invest in education.
 - States with low teacher salaries tend to have more teacher shortages.
 - The percent is higher in communities with the greatest socio-economic need.

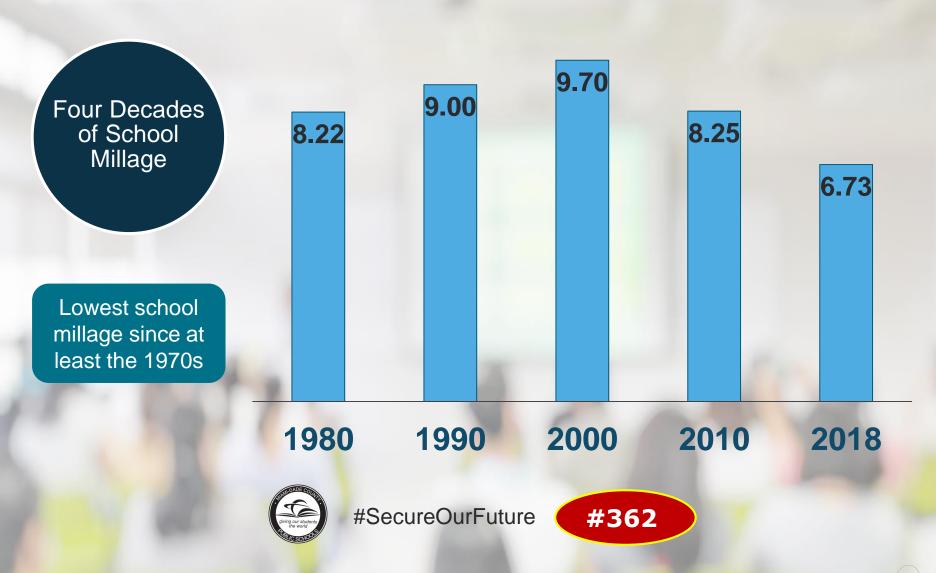

In total, 7 counties passed referendums for operating expenses, including safety and salaries, in the primary. Five counties, including Miami-Dade are on the ballot in November.





- A county referendum with a proposed levy based upon determined value of a property for up to four (4) years
 - Recommended by Teacher Salary Task Force comprised of teachers, administrators, parents, community/business representatives
 - Generates revenue for teacher salaries and additional safety and security
 - Lowest tax rate since 1980 even with proposed levy
 - Establishes an oversight committee to monitor expenditure of funds



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Impact on Property Owners

- The average homeowner would make a contribution of \$0.39 a day, or \$12 a month.
- Approximately \$232M in 2019-2020 at current tax roll estimates

Impact on Workforce

- 80%-90% of funds generated used for teacher salaries
- 10%-20% for additional safety and security, including fulltime Miami-Dade Schools Police officer at every school
- Teacher increases must be negotiated through collective bargaining.

- Visible law enforcement helps deter crime and promotes a safe learning environment.
- Our children deserve to be educated by talented teachers.
